Kitchen Chats

FROZEN BAKED BEANS
How nice it is to go to your freezer, whether it be home or commercial, and get a packaged estew, baked beans, chicken a la king, or pie which you have previously prepared in quantity and frozen until you need them. These are useful for a meal-in-a-hurry or when unexpected guests drop in.

BAKED BEANS
4 cups navy beans
2 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/4 cup molasses
1/3 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon dry mustard
6 cups water
1/2 lbs. salt pork cut in 1/2" strips
1 medium-sized onion, quartered
Wash and inspect beans. Cover with water and soak overnight. Drain. Combine salt, molasses, brown sugar, mustard and water, and add to beans. Pour into large bean pot or casserole. Press salt pork and onion onto top of beans. Cover and bake at 300 degrees Fahrenheit for 6 hours. Remove cover during last half hour. Yield: 12 cups, 6 pint packages or 3 quart packages.
Directions for serving—Place beans in a saucepan with 1/4 cup water. Cover; heat slowly for 15 to 20 minutes. As beans thaw, break apart gently and stir occasionally to prevent stick. Or, thaw beans at room temperature and heat slowly in saucepan for five minutes, stirring occasionally.

AAA NEWS

LOAN RATES INCREASED—Wheat loan rates on the 1946 crop will average about 10 1/2 cents above last year for all Oregon stations, as a result of a three cent increase above the original eight cent rate announced last week. About one-half cent of the three-cent boost was absorbed by higher freight rates, which are used in calculating differentials between terminal and country point loan values.

The terminal loan rate at Portland now stands at \$1.60 a bushel. Loan rate for Malheur county 1. \$1.35 per bushel on No. 1 grade. Full information on 1946 commodity loan programs, which include wheat, rye, barley, oats, potatoes and hay and pasture crop seeds, can be obtained from the office of the Malheur county Agricultural Conservation association (AAA), city hall, Ontario.

FERTILIZER BELOW NEEDS—Farmers face another short year in world supplies of fertilizer despite increased production in many countries, the department of agriculture revealed last week. World requirements for nitrogen exceed supplies by nearly a million tons, or 25 per cent. Phosphate rock requirements are 16 per cent greater than estimated supplies, while supplies and needs for potash will balance only if Germany can reach pre-war export levels. U. S. production of fertilizer materials in the 1946-47 period is expected to maintain or slightly exceed the peak war level—nearly double the 1935-39 average domestic use. But world needs have been heightened by the low output in wartime countries during the past few years.

WHEAT SITUATION IMPROVES—U. S. wheat supplies for the coming year are now estimated at 1,230 million bushels, consisting of a prospective crop of 1,132 million bushels—the largest on record, and a carryover of 101 million bushels—the second smallest in 20 years. Recent increases in the size of the prospective U. S. crop will allow larger quantities for export and carryover under tentative estimates of distribution—announced last May. In million bushels, these estimates now are: Food, 450, feed, 150, seed 85, exports upwards of 250, carry-over 250 to 300 on July 1, 1947.

Present prospects are for a world wheat production of 8 to 10 per cent above production in 1945.

perhaps not far from the 1935-39 average. Larger supplies of other grains are expected to be available for food. Here are wheat prospects for the other three principal wheat exporting countries: Canada: 25.2 million acres seeded in the prairie provinces, an increase of 12 per cent; 445,000 acres in winter wheat, a third less than in 1945. Australia: Over 13 million acres seeded, about average and well above the 11.5 million seeded last year. Argentina: Substantially more acreage seeded than a year ago; conditions more favorable.

EXTRACTION RATE UPPEP—To increase needed supplies of crystalline sugar by 24 million pounds annually, the department of agriculture has amended war food order No. 7 to increase the extraction rate of refined sugar from raw sugar. At the same time, this action will decrease the production of non-rationed refiners' sugars to about 14 million gallons for the year which began July 1 compared with 22 million in 1945.

MUDDY CREEK ELK ARE VERY LIMITED

The early elk season in the Muddy creek area of Baker county will not provide good elk hunting for too many sportsmen, the Oregon state game commission said. This special season is slated for August 31 to September 2 with a bag limit of one bull elk, and is designed to drive elk from an area in which they have caused damage to growing crops this summer.

The area open includes only approximately 30 sections in the Rock creek drainage adjacent to farm lands. A comparatively small herd of elk has remained in this area through summer feeding in the field at night and ascending the steep slopes of the Blue mountains before daylight. They will probably leave the area opened when the shooting begins. It is estimated that this problem herd includes about 50 animals, not over 20 of which are bulls and it is not probable that any number of hunters will kill more than half of the bulls present on this steep, brushy habitat.

Special licenses will not be required for this early season because the limited area opened provides a control of the number of animals that may be taken and a low success is anticipated. The bag limit does not include cows and calves because removal of the cows might result in the loss of young calves and neither

the cows or calves would be in good condition.
