LABOR DEMAND ON FARMS NEAR PEAK

Labor demands of Oregon farmers are increasing daily and will continue to do so until the peak of the harvest season is reached about August 25, states J. R. Beck, state supervisor of the O. S. C. Extension service emergency farm labor program.

If and when a farm labor shortage materializes, it will undoubtedly hit during the period from August 25 to September 20 when the Oregon harvest will be at its peak, Beck says. Thus far in the summer harvest, no crop losses have been reported as a result of a labor shortage.

Peak demands for labor in the state will be felt when snap beans and hops overlap in the Willamette valley; when pears and hops will be harvested in Jackson and Josephine counties respectively, and during pear picking at Hood River. All of these crops will be harvested, at least in part, during the same period. Potatoes in the Klamath section will be coming on soon after the first of September to make other demands on the labor supply.

Housing has been the key to the farm labor supply thus far, Beck reports. Farmers who have set up tents and provided camping facilities on their farms have had no trouble in attracting harvest workers.

The migrant labor camps, too, have reported full to overflowing populations since their opening to admit itinerant workers and their families. In fact, two additional farmer groups are contemplating establishing migrant housing facilities. These are the Central Oregon Potato Growers association which plans to use the abandoned Redmond army airbase, and the Klamath Potato Growers association which has plans to utilize an old CCC camp located at Merrill.

BARLEY CONTEST OPEN TO FARMERS

A special malting barley contest at the land products division of the Pacific Livestock exposition will be open to Malheur county farmers, announces Harry Sandquist, county agent.

Separate divisions will be made for two-row and six-row barley varieties. A first prize of \$250 and

a second prize of \$100 will be made for each division, making a total of \$700 in cash prizes.

Any grower who has 20 acres of barley can enter the contest. Each exhibit must be a full 100-pound sack, and the county PMA committee must certify that the sack came from a field of 20 acres or more. Each prospective contestant should get in touch with the committee before threshing time. Other information such as sacking and shipping can be obtained from the county extension office, Sandquist stated.

E. R. Jackman, crop specialist on the state college staff, said these premiums are large enough to pay anyone's time. Oregon is

becoming noted as the producer of some of the best malting barley to be found anywhere.

Jackman emphasizes that for malting purposes the barley must not be cracked in threshing. He states that some otherwise excellent malting lots sometimes are ruined by threshing so closely that the kernels are skinned or cracked.

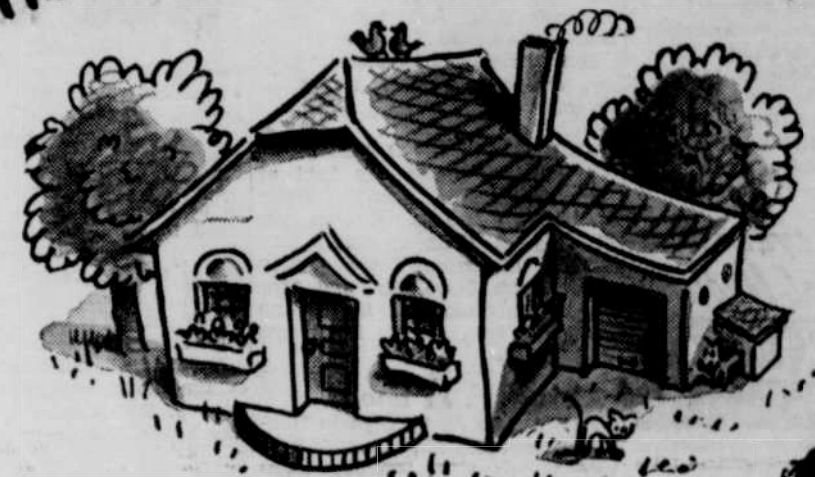

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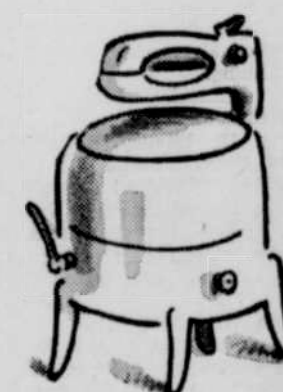
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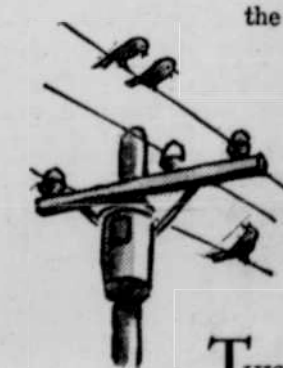
