**PASTEURIZERS WILL GET EXAMINATIONS**  
A short course and state examination for pasteurizer operators in this area will be conducted next week, the state department of agriculture announced. The short course will be held Tuesday afternoon, September 10, under the auspices of the dairy manufacturing de-

partment of Oregon State college and will be a refresher for the state examinations, to be held all day Wednesday, September 11. Both sessions will be held in Ontario. Place and hours may be obtained from the county agent.

This is a fourth in a series of such sessions being held over the state this fall for applicants for the state pasteurizer operator licenses.

Applicants will be tested in written and oral phases at the September 11 examinations, announced Kenneth Carl, assistant chief of the division of foods and dairies of the state department of agriculture. Before licenses are issued the applicants will be scored in their respective plants on a practical demonstration of pasteurizer operation.

Applications for employment during the coming beet processing campaign are now being received at the Nyssa factory. All former campaign employees as well as others who are interested in working should file an application at once.

The regular work week will be 56 hours (seven 8 hour shifts). Time and one-half will be paid after the first (40) straight time hours worked. The lowest hourly rate paid for men will be eighty-five (.85) per hour for the first 40 hours worked, and one and one-half (1 1/2) times that rate for the next 16 hours worked.

The above rate will make \$54.40 for a 56 hour work week.

The campaign will start about September 23 and will run for approximately 140 days, due to the large beet acreage that will be harvested this year.

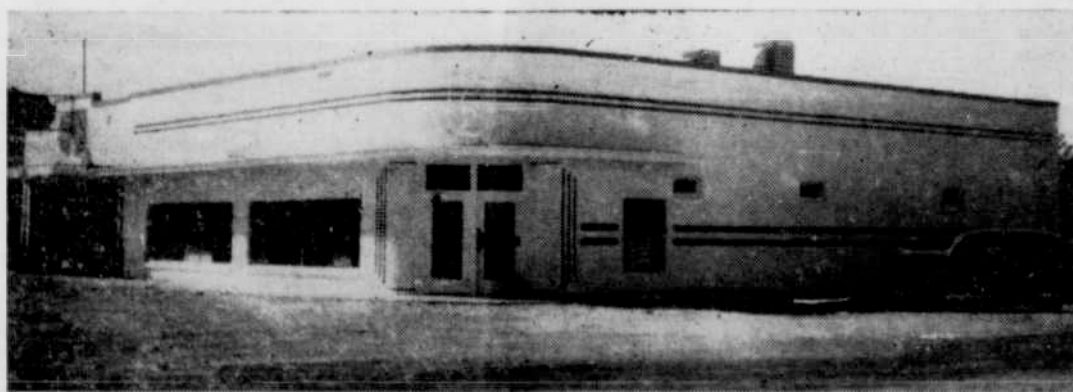
