SURPLUS PROPERTY IS SOLD IN OREGON

PORTLAND, September, 12—The Portland War Assets office liquidated surplus property worth more than four million dollars, government cost, during August, according to C. T. Mudge, regional director.

Property in this region's inventory, with a book value of \$2,744,972.40 was sold for \$1,217,356.09, a recovery of approximately 43 per cent. Through inter-regional operations—locating material, equipment and supplies all over the country for buyers in Oregon and southwestern Washington—\$250,007 worth of surplus was sold for \$169,899, a recovery of 66 per cent.

The Portland region's rapidly growing automotive and construction machinery division disposed of \$1,807,000 worth of surplus for \$1,125,000, about 70 per cent recovery.

Coming months will show rapidly increasing sales from the national inventory as the result of current plans for surplus in large supply to be definitely allocated to the thirty-three regional offices so that each can make direct sales to its customers without checking to see if the items are still available, Mudge said.

In addition, the Portland office served hundreds of persons by informing them of various site sales, where the buyer is required to be present, over the nation.

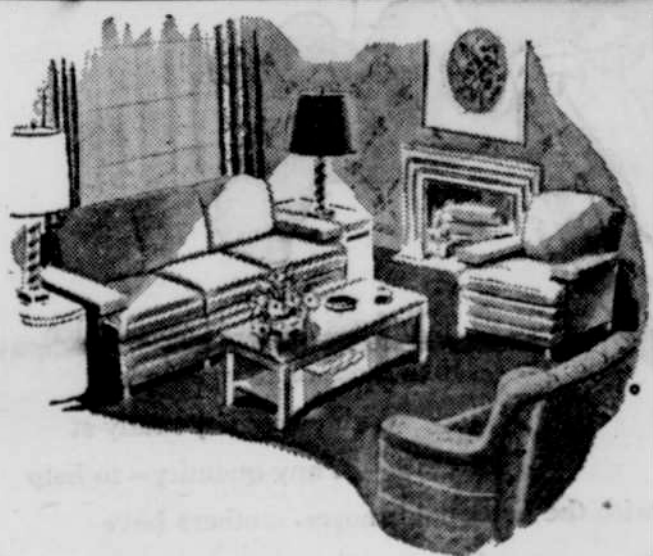

WATER USERS WILL SEND DELEGATION

Idaho will send a large delegation to the annual meeting of the National Reclamation Association at Omaha, to join with water users of the seventeen western states in vigorously opposing the Steelman Directive, especially as it would stop construction on supplemental water projects, according to William E. Welsh, secretary-manager of the Idaho State Reclamation association in Boise.

"This directive," Welsh said, "was issued by John R. Steelman, director of War Mobilization and Reconstruction, on August 5. This directive was preceded by the President of the United States under date of August 2, authorizing curtailment of the program for construction of public works projects. The President, in his letter, requested that expenditures for construction by the Bureau of Reclamation be limited to \$85,000,000 for each of the fiscal years, 1947 and 1948."

"The water users of Idaho," Welsh continued, "are very much concerned as to the effect this directive will have on the construction of reclamation projects in this state. They are particularly concerned with such Bureau of Reclamation projects as Anderson Ranch reservoir, Cascade reservoir and Palisades reservoir. These projects will provide supplemental water to more than a million acres of land in southern Idaho. Supplemental water has long been recognized as one of the most serious needs and important problems confronting water users of this state. Idaho water users have been well pleased with the consideration that has been given to this problem by the Bureau of Reclamation."

"The question of valley authorities will be another important issue to be considered at this meeting. Each year for several years past the National Reclamation Association, one of the most powerful water organizations in the United States, has gone on record strongly opposing the creation of valley authorities. The Idaho delegation has always voted in opposition to the authorities—in most cases un-
