RUSSIA HAS CONFLICTS

Apparently the United States government is not the only government in the world that has conflicting ideas within its ranks relative to foreign policies.

Prime Minister Joseph Stalin of Russia has announced that he sees no real danger of a new war and expressed his unqualified belief in the possibility of long and friendly collaboration between the soviet union and the western democracies.

At the same time Stalin stated that the presence of American troops in China was a threat to peace.

Also this week Andrei A. Gromyko, Russian delegate to the Paris peace conference, stated that American troops in foreign countries are a menace to peace. He insisted that the presence of Anglo-American troops in China, India, Iraq, Egypt, Iceland, Indonesia, Greece and Latin American countries be investigated by the united nations organization.

Certainly the professed belief of Stalin in the possibility of long and friendly collaboration between Russia and the western democracies is not in accord with the attitude of the Anglo-American bloc at the Paris peace conference or at previous meetings sponsored by the united nations organization. The Russian delegates at the conference have refused repeatedly to cooperate with the western powers, principally because the Anglo-American group have attempted to protect the interests of the smaller countries in eastern Europe against the Russian bear.

The Russians are past masters at spreading propaganda, but certainly anyone should be able to see that Stalin's expressed wish for cooperation with other powers is in direct conflict with Russian tactics around the peace table. They want peace as long as the rest of the world lets them develop a cordon of buffer states around Russian territory through the use of armed threats and political propaganda.

DEER SEASON WILL OPEN SAT., SEPT. 28

The general deer season for the state will open Saturday, September 28 and will extend through October 25. The bag limit is one deer, either blacktail or mule, having not less than forked antlers.

There will also be a short season for archers, September 28 to October 6, to take deer of either sex in a small portion of the Deschutes game refuge, including approximately 15 sections south of Paulina creek. Archers will be required to check in and out of the hunting area through station located at northeast corner of the area.

A portion of the Canyon creek refuge lying north and east of Canyon creek will be open to archers to take deer of either sex from October 9 to October 25. The checking station will be at Resort. The remainder of the Canyon creek reserve will be open to rifle hunting during the regular season for deer.

The first of the special shoots will be held in the Burnt river area for deer of either sex from September 22 to 27. Only 100 tags were authorized for this hunt. Hunters will be required to check in and out of the area at Hereford.

All checking stations maintained by the game commission for special deer and elk shoots will open at noon one and one-half days before the opening of each season and will remain open until 5 p. m. the day following the end of the season.

AIR MAIL RATE REDUCED OCT. 1

In accordance with the congressional act of August 14, 1946, the domestic air rate will be reduced from eight cents per ounce or fraction thereof to five cents per ounce or fraction thereof October 1.

The new rate only affects the rate in the United States but by the inclusion of U. S. possessions drastically reduces the air rate to them. The new five cent air mail rate is applicable to mail transported by air as follows: Within the continental United

States, including Alaska.

To or from the continental United States, including Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands of the United States, Canton Island, Canal zone, Guam and any other place where the United States mail service is in operation.

Within or between any of the territories listed.

To or from members of the armed forces of the United States stationed outside the continental United States whose address includes an army office number or a fleet post office designation; also to or from civilian personnel authorized to receive mail through such army or navy post offices.

Only letters in their usual and ordinary form not weighing in excess of two ounces may, at the APO's and navy post offices except APO in care of postmaster at New Orleans or Seattle. This regulation replaces the present six cent per half ounce rate now in effect on mail to the armed forces.
