CARE IS URGED ON PERSONS WHO WALK

Winter months mean greater traffic hazards to unwary pedestrians, Chief of Police O. F. Maze said in urging persons who walk to exercise greater care to avoid accidents.

"Longer hours of darkness and decreased visibility, due to rain, fog or other inclement weather conditions, increase the danger to the pedestrian", Chief Maze said.

Chief Maze said figures recently compiled in the office of Robert S. Farrell, Jr., secretary of state, indicated that the ratio of pedestrian fatalities to all traffic fatalities increases considerably during winter months.

"During the first quarter of 1946, Farrell's figures show that pedestrian fatalities amounted to 47 per cent of all fatalities, but during the second quarter of this year, pedestrian fatalities constituted only 24 per cent of the total fatal accidents reported in Oregon."

With traffic deaths for the first half of 1946 nearly 60 per cent greater than the death toll for the same period of 1945, the need for greater care in walking and driving is obvious, Chief Maze declared.

He urged all pedestrians to accept responsibility for their own safety in traffic by crossing streets only at intersections, waiting on the curb for approaching cars to pass, especially at night, and to avoid the dangerous practice of stepping out into the street from between parked cars.

Drivers, said the chief, can do their part by yielding the right-of-way to pedestrians in crosswalks and by being on the alert for persons on foot in the vicinity of schools, churches and other public gathering places.

JUNIOR RED CROSS TO ENROLL MEMBERS

Mrs. John S. Conway of Vale, Malheur county Junior Red Cross chairman, has announced that the enrollment period of the organization will run from November 1 to 15. Materials will be distributed to schools this week.

Many projects are available through this group. Those that have been satisfactory in this county include gift boxes for the children in devastated war areas. The boxes contain such articles as soap, tooth brushes, pencils, paper and small toys. The boxes to be filled are provided by the Junior Red Cross.

DEMONSTRATION ON TICKS, LICE IS SET

The first public demonstration of tick and lice control methods in Malheur county, is to be given at 2 p. m., November 18 on the ranch of Ike Thayer, near the CCC camp north of Ontario, Harry Sandquist, county agent, announced.

Increasing costs of producing fat livestock have made the producers more conscious of the decrease in weight and loss of life in their cattle and sheep now than at any time in the past. Livestock coming from the range are usually molested with ticks and lice. These external parasites cause loss in weight through blood loss and nervousness.

Bill Ross, local cattle man, said that much more economical gains are obtained when the cattle are free from ticks and lice. Two chemicals, DDT and rotenone, are used for control of these parasites. Rotenone is also excellent for grub control but must be applied with a high pressure sprayer. DDT can be applied as a spray or a dip. The demonstration on November 18 will be a combination spray-dip operation.
