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ADVERTISING NYSSA IS EXPECTED TO PAY DIVIDENDS

The pulling power of information advertising states and communities such as the Nyssa chamber of commerce has undertaken through publication of a brochure about this vicinity is emphasized by the response received from magazine advertising done by the state highway commission travel information department.

The information of the highway commission recently received answers to ads placed over 10 years ago. The day that the mail brought an inquiry from George Jacobs of Brussels, Belgium, in response to the September 28, 1944 Saturday Evening Post ad, also arrived five requests from the east for Oregon folders, as advertised in National Geographic in 1936. The next day a query arrived from Brooklyn, New York in answer to the second Geographic ad placed in the same year.

With the coming of peace, an expanded program has been started by the highway department, with several ads appearing this fall in national magazines, bringing responses from every state in the union and foreign countries.

The Nyssa brochure will have a similar effect, but perhaps on a smaller scale. Not enough of the pamphlets have been distributed yet to expect any particular response. In fact, the greatest interest created in the Nyssa area through the brochure can be expected next spring and summer, when traveling is more popular.

Gernhardt Urges Freedom's Fight

might be free. Follow those men and women who followed in His train, who faced demagogues and damned their treachery, had their

bones laid in the catacombs, shouted in freedom until the flames swept down their throats and added to the long line of martyrs, men and women who would be free."

Rev. Gernhardt cited examples of a long list of heroes and said "If I could gather the blood men have spilled it would flow a mighty

river down to an ocean of human gore; if I could gather the tears of the heart broken fathers and mothers, wives and children and their briny water would flood the earth. If I could make you feel the hunger of the starving and the sufferings of the ill-clothed, the loneliness of the homeless we might begin to sense what price freedom.

"Thus far we have faced What Price Freedom as an exclamation. It thrills one to the depth to recount the price men have paid for freedom. But that thrill calls society to account. It poses a question, what price freedom? What are we obligated to think and feel and do the torch of freedom carried so faithfully by others and handed to us may be made to burn clearer, brighter even surer than ever before? It is never so thrilling to seriously face facts, weigh values and go in direct search of responsibility and obligation. There can be no genuine consistent freedom apart from individuals who compose a free society. Freedom rests back on the individual citizen. It is an exacting personal matter. Epictetus wrote, 'No man is free who is not master of himself' and no man is a genuine citizen of a free country who accepts the full benefits of that freedom without contributing fully to its being.

"We must see that the character of a person is the real foundation of society and the character of the citizen is the foundation of the nation. What price freedom? It is the price of each person developing a character and personality that demonstrates what it means to be free.

"What price freedom? It is the price of genuine respect of others. "What price freedom? Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty.

"What price freedom? A rediscovery and adequate cultivation of the roots of freedom."

Don M. Graham, prominent Malheur county ex-serviceman, introduced Rev. Gernhardt and officers of the Nyssa post of the Legion.

Mr. Graham pointed out that in addition to the heroic dead of world war I, people of the nation gathered to pay tribute to the memory of the young men who died in the second world war.

"We hope the American people will ever remember the sacrifices made by these men."

H. O. Hopkins, commander of the Nyssa post, presided during part of the program. He said "We hope to see more of the young veterans turn out to our meetings. We are trying to build up our membership."

Other post officers introduced were Paul Heldt, vice commander;

Arthur Rouse, post adjutant; Hugh Tobler, finance officer, and Dr. J. T. Long, chaplain.

Following presentation of the colors, the audience sang the national anthem, led by Spencer Lane and accompanied by the high school band directed by Lynn Lawrence.

Other numbers on the program were given as follows:

Invocation, Rev. Lloyd Pounds; march, high school band; vocal solo, "The House I Live In", Spencer Lane, accompanied by Adrienne Peterson; vocal solo, "God Bless America", June Savage, accompanied by Adrienne Peterson; retirement of flags, Commander H.
