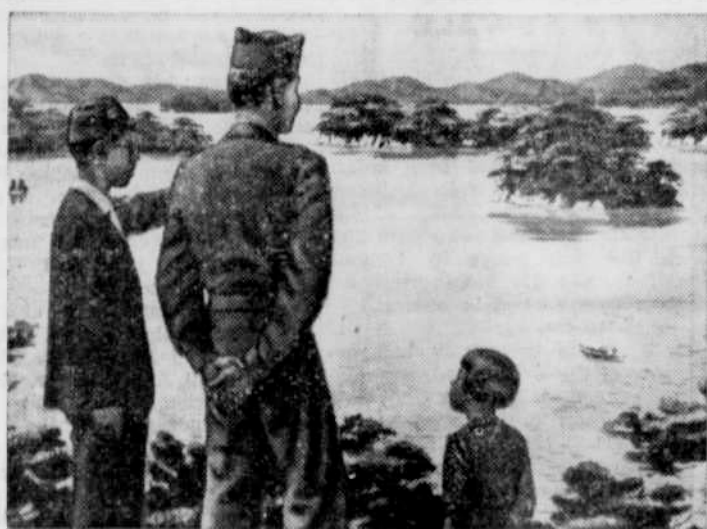

LOAN AGENCIES OF GOVERNMENT IN CO. ARE CONSOLIDATED

Farm Security's county office, Wilson building, Ontario, officially became a field office of the new farmers' home administration, consolidating FSA and emergency crop and seed loan programs, November 1.

Simultaneously, Donald J. Kudrna, senior FSA supervisor, received notification he has been designated as interim FSA supervisor, pending completion of reorganization. Counties served by the office will continue to include Malheur and Harney.

"Present FSA and emergency crop and seed loan borrowers will be effected little if any by the consolidation except that these credit services will now be available from one office," said Kudrna. "The new FSA created under public law 731 or the Cooley bill is authorized to make annual crop and seed loans, long-time supervised operating goods loans, 40-year farm ownership loans, small water facility and group service loans."

All FSA and emergency crop loan accounts will be consolidated in the FSA office as soon as possible and borrowers of the two former credit agencies given complete services by the new agency, explained Kudrna. New loan applications will be accepted and processed beginning November 12.

Detailed information on changes in authorization or procedures will be reported on following a state conference of all supervisors scheduled at Bend, Oregon, November 1 to 8.

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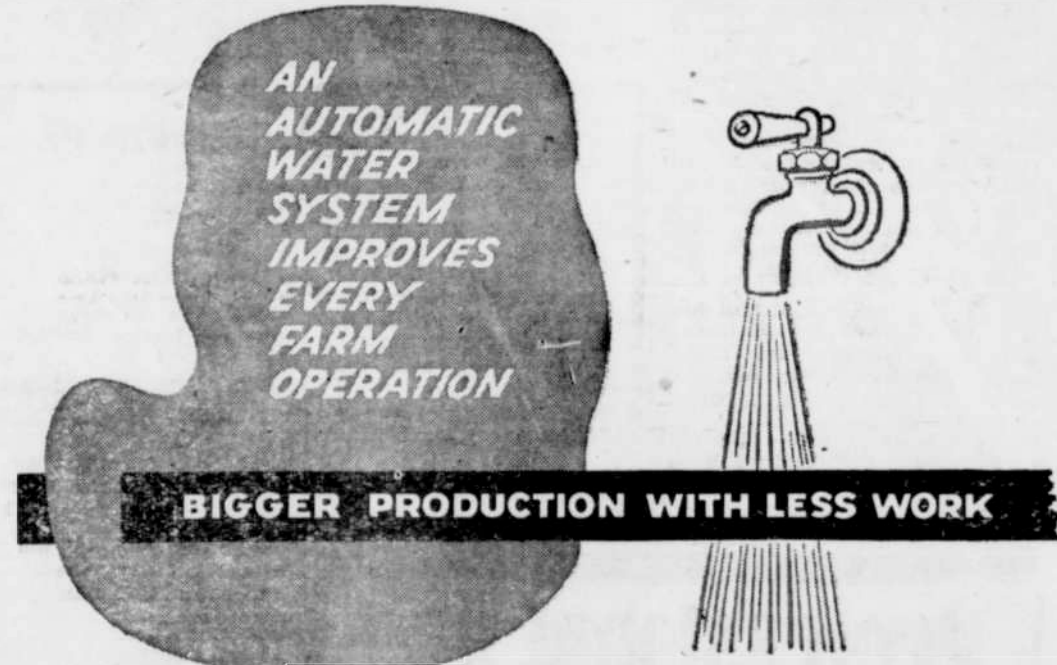

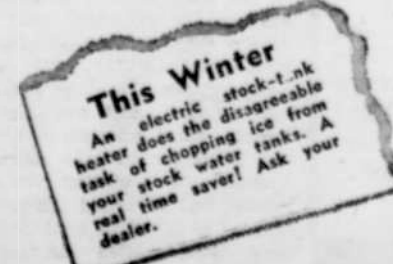
