Action will begin on Friday on the baseball diamond, where the freshman class will have gathered material for a huge bonfire. This will be the site of a struggle between the freshman and sophomore classes from Friday morning at 8 until four o'clock of the same afternoon. The sophomores will attempt to start the fire prematurely and the freshmen will battle to keep it from being done. At 4 o'clock a truce will be signed.
