AMALGAMATED IS MAKING SYRUP

process in extraction and refining of beet sugar began in 1940 in an associated laboratory exploration of the Amalgamated Sugar company and the Dorr company, nationally-famous chemical concern.

"Six-inch diametered test tubes were used as ion-exchange cells in which synthetic resins were laid on the bottom of the cation (positive) cells and the liquid containing the sugar was diffused from beets by the old standard process was forced through these resins.

"The resulting acid solution was then run into the anion cells where the ion-exchange continued, leaving an exceptionally high grade sugar in the liquid drawn from the (negative) cells.

"At this point the present process of evaporation, and then the crystallization and drying procedures followed, resulting in a better grade of refined sugar and a greater recovery, and which also eliminated completely the use of the Steffen house of the old process for recovery of sugars as far as possible from the syrups that had carried recoverable sugar into what would have otherwise have been waste materials.

"Because of the heavy acid liquid resulting from the action of

the cation cells, all cells, tubing, valves and other parts of the apparatus must be rubber lined.

"However, the synthetic resins through which the liquid containing the diffused sugar passes are not lost, but are rejuvenated by the simple process of a sulphuric acid bath, while the acid in the anion cells is neutralized with ammonia to bring it back to an alkaline condition.

"This, in brief, is the newly-discovered ion-exchange or organo-olite process of extraction and refining of beet sugar which has become the first major change of sugar making since the time of Napoleon Bonaparte, when beet sugar making was developed in France.

"From the test tube experiments in the laboratory came the next step—setting up of a pilot plant—which was done in the Burley, Idaho plant of the Amalgamated Sugar company and was run successfully in 1941 and 1942, but which was closed during the remaining war years.

"When the pilot plant operations were resumed in 1945, its success was sufficiently indicated that the company began erection and installation of a full-capacity plant in connection with its Twin Falls plant, completion of which was anticipated for part of this year's beet run."
