Valuation Of Livestock Set

Livestock valuations as the basis for tax assessments for the year 1947 were recently set at a meeting of the Eastern Oregon Assessors association.

County Assessor E. P. Hendrix announced the valuations as follows:

Horses—Work horses, \$20 to \$40; saddle horses, \$50 to \$100; pack and range horses, \$10 to \$15.

Cattle, Dairy—Dairy cattle, 6 months to 1 year, \$10; Dairy cattle, 1 to 2 year old, \$60; Common cows, \$100.

Bulls, Dairy—Registered, \$150; Grade, \$100.

Range Cattle—Range cattle 6 months to 1 year, \$50; Range 1 to 2 year old, \$80; Common cows, \$90.

Bulls, Range—Registered, \$150; Grade, \$100.

Sheep—\$8.

Hogs—Brood sows, \$50; Boars, \$50; Weaners and Shoats, By weight per 100lb \$15.

Poultry—Chickens and Ducks, \$1.50; Turkeys, \$6; Geese, \$2.

Bees—Per hive, \$6.
