**"CRANBERRIES GLAMORIZE MENUS"**

Holiday menus are not complete without cranberries in some form or another and the comfortable supply of cranberries is good news to the holiday-minded cooks.

Cranberry Sherbert makes an interesting accompaniment to a bounteous Thanksgiving dinner for it is tart, cool, and colorful.

**CRANBERRY SHERBERT**

2 cups cranberries  
1-1/4 cups water  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 tablespoon gelatin  
1/4 cup cold water  
2 tablespoons lemon juice

Combine cranberries and water in saucepan. Cover and bring to steaming point on HIGH heat. Turn to LOW heat and continue cooking until skins pop. Press through fine sieve. Add sugar and gelatin, which has been softened until dissolved. Cool and add lemon juice. Pour into refrigerator tray; freeze with Cold Control at coldest setting. When firm, turn into chilled bowl and beat with chilled beaters until smooth and light. Return to tray and refreeze. (Serves 6).

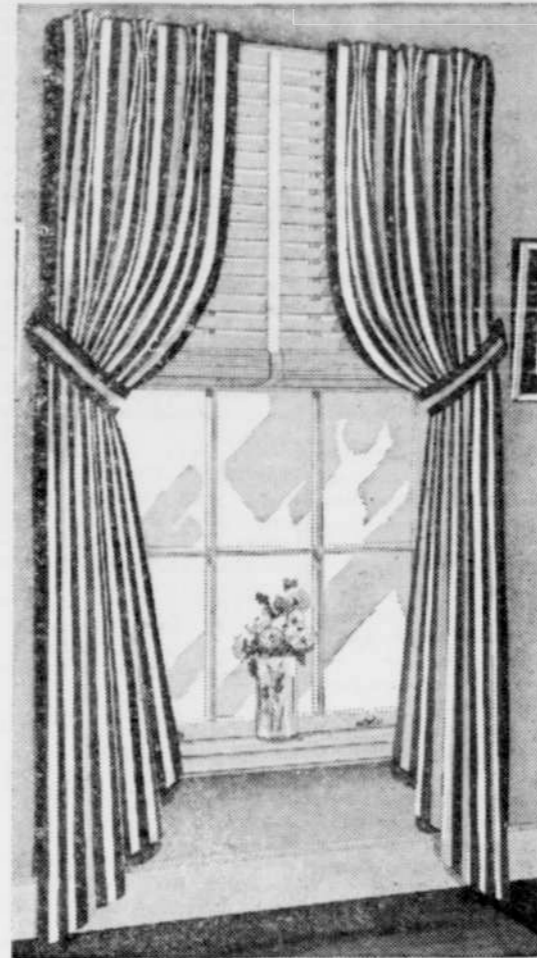
