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WE NEED NEW SYSTEM

The dictatorial conclusion of the United Mine Workers strike against the government by John L. Lewis emphatically reveals a festering condition in the ranks of labor that must be cured if the national economy is to flourish. When 400,000 men belong to an organization headed by a man who holds absolute authority over them so far as their economic life

concerned there is something wrong with the system. Lewis can without any recourse, on the part of the men effected, tell the workers when to quit work and when to return to their jobs, as revealed by his handling of the recent coal strike.

We must have a union system that prohibits the calling of a strike without a vote of the union members and only after a "cooling off" period. We must reduce the power of the leaders, without detracting from the rights of men to collective bargaining.

Lewis and his cohorts are crying out that their freedom has been taken from them by an unworthy government, yet their dictatorship over the lives of the men working under them is almost as complete as the reigns of Hitler and Mussolini.

Like many another rabble rouser, Lewis and his kind want freedom—for themselves, but not for others. The reason his kind is given so much lee-way is that the people generally want to show that democracy means what it was established for—freedom for everyone to do as he pleases so long as he does not jeopardize the freedom and rights of others.

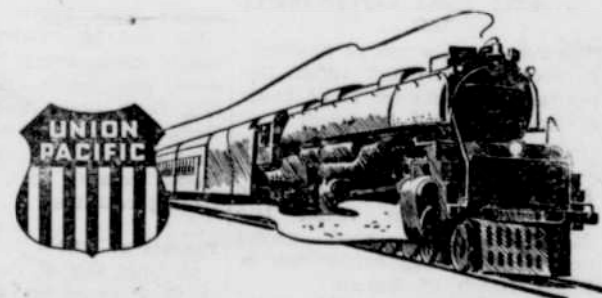
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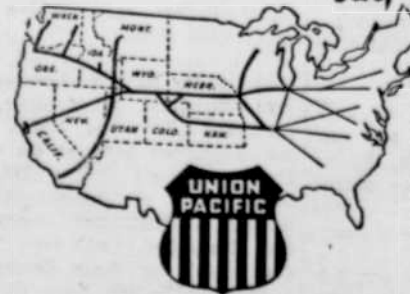
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
