TRANSIENT HOUSING WILL BE PROBLEM

Housing for the families of transient workers is the most urgent problem of Malheur county agriculture for the next few years, inasmuch as men with families will have to be relied upon, rather than single men from Mexico and elsewhere in the reasonably near future, according to J. R. Beck, emergency farm labor executive, for Oregon, who met with the Malheur county farm labor committee in Ontario last Thursday.

Urgency of the problem is illustrated by the fact that there are not more than 600 residential buildings on farms in the county, in excess of the number of farms.

Probably half of these are occupied by members of the farm families so only about 300 are available for transient workers' families.

A survey of transient workers indicated that well over 90 per cent have families which must be housed, Mr. Beck said.
