

PROGRAM OF FARM TRAINING STARTED

ADRIAN (Special)—Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Dierking and Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Steelman and Donna Lee were callers Friday evening in the Floyd Lomax home near Parma.

The veterans administration is offering an agricultural training program to the veterans of world war II. This training is to help the veterans with their farming and farm troubles. Any veteran inter-

ested in the training may attend. James Allen, formerly of Eugene, Oregon, is teaching this course at the Adrian high school building for this community. The veterans meet regularly once a week, and occasionally twice, depending on their subject. Ordinarily they meet every Wednesday evening. The veterans administration pays all expenses, including the wages that the veterans receive while learning. A single man is paid \$35 per month and a married man \$50 a month. Any fully employed veteran on his own farm, his father's farm, or employed as a hired man may take this training. Henry Reuter, Ad-

rian high school agriculture instructor, assists in teaching whatever shop work is needed. Leno Christensen teaches shop work at Nyssa. The community between Adrian and Nyssa is divided in half, one half going to Nyssa for training and the other half coming to Adrian. There are now 26 members enrolled in the Adrian project, according to Mr. Allen. Highlights of work accomplished by the Adrian chapter of Future Farmers of America for 1945-46 have been announced. Twenty-five boys were enrolled in agriculture, 24 carrying projects. Of these, one quit school, and four failed to turn in project records, leaving 19 completed projects.

To carry on these 19 projects, the boys invested \$1746.50. Their total labor income was \$1617.42, an average of \$85.12 per boy. They had 14 acres in crops, and owned 68 head of livestock.

Average wool clip per head of ewes was 10.3 pounds. Per cent lamb crop raised was 155 per cent.

MORE SAMPLING OF MILK ANTICIPATED

Increased sampling of dairy products, including milk and manufactured items, will be carried on this year by the state department of agriculture as one phase of its program to assist in rebuilding the quality of Oregon's dairy products. Greater supervision of licensed graders of milk and cream in dairy plants throughout the state is also promised.

This report was given by R. M. Smith of Baker, who represents the department's division of foods and dairies and weights and measures in this territory. Smith attended the division's semi-annual meeting in Salem last week-end.

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bout milk and milk problems, and because they fell below the 80 per cent butterfat requirement; five were from out-of-state and carried no grade emblem as required by Oregon law.

Most amazing of all was that of the 48 samples labeled as grade A butter, only eight actually scored out grade A. Thirty-six scored grade B, three scored grade C and one was below any grade.

Smith said several factors were reported by division leaders as responsible for the policy of tightening up on inspections and sampling related to the milk industry. Particularly striking was the report of O. K. Beals, chief of the division, that the first regulatory scoring of butter held since 1943 was highly disappointing from a quality standpoint. Of 55 samples of butter scored, eight were illegal
