The hands of the Nyssa Eagles to the tune of 67-50.

Starting the first quarter with a series of fast breaks, the Eagles took an early lead against New Plymouth, leading 15-5 at the end of the first quarter, and increasing it to 32-24 by the end of the first half. Holding the New Plymouth quintet to eight points in the third quarter, the Nyssa team scored 21 points in this period and coasted in the final quarter to take a decisive win.

D. Willson of Nyssa again took scoring honors with 21 points, followed by Belton and Holman, each dumping in 12 counters. Hills was high for New Plymouth, topping all scorers with 26 points.

In a more closely contested game, the Eagles also won the preliminary over the New Plymouth five by the slim margin of 34-27. Overcoming a halftime deficit of 14-7, Nyssa forged ahead in the third quarter to lead 24-19. With the lead changing hands several times in the final period, Nyssa put on a rally that New Plymouth was unable to check, winning 34-27.

WESTERN MAN'S
SELECTION ASKED

At a meeting of the republican conference of the United States senate January 2, Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon protested the failure of the committee on committees to appoint a Pacific coast senator to the committee on foreign relations. He did not ask for such an appointment solely for himself but made clear to the conference that he believed that either he or some Pacific coast senator with senate seniority rights superior to his, should be appointed in the interest of the people of the Pacific coast area.

Although Senator Morse's motion to postpone final consideration of

the report of the committee on committees until it could be given more careful study failed, Senator Vandenberg undoubtedly expressed the view of the great majority of the senators when he stated to the republican conference that Senator Morse was right in his contention that the foreign relations committee should have on it a senator from the Pacific coast and he recommended that the next vacancy on the foreign relations committee should be filled by appointing a Pacific coast senator.

After the conference Senator Morse said, "I particularly objected to the committee's selection of certain republican members of the committee on foreign relations. Of the seven republicans selected, three, White of Maine, Smith of New Jersey, and Lodge of Massachusetts, come from the east coast; four, Vandenberg of Michigan, Capper of Kansas, Willey of Wisconsin and Hickenlooper of Iowa, come from the middle west. Not a single senator was selected from the Pacific coast."

"Foreign relations problems are of vital concern to all sections of the country, and in many respects

they are of particular concern to the Pacific coast. Therefore, I felt that the committee on committees made a grievous mistake. Although my motion was defeated, I am gratified that many senators have expressed to me what Senator Vandenberg expressed to the conference when he pointed out in effect that although he voted against my motion, he did so because he considered it was too late to try

to modify the report of the committee on committees because of the six-weeks' work which had gone into its making; but that he was in complete agreement with me that the Pacific coast should have a representative of the foreign relations committee; and he trusted that the next vacancy on the committee would be filled by a senator from the Pacific coast."

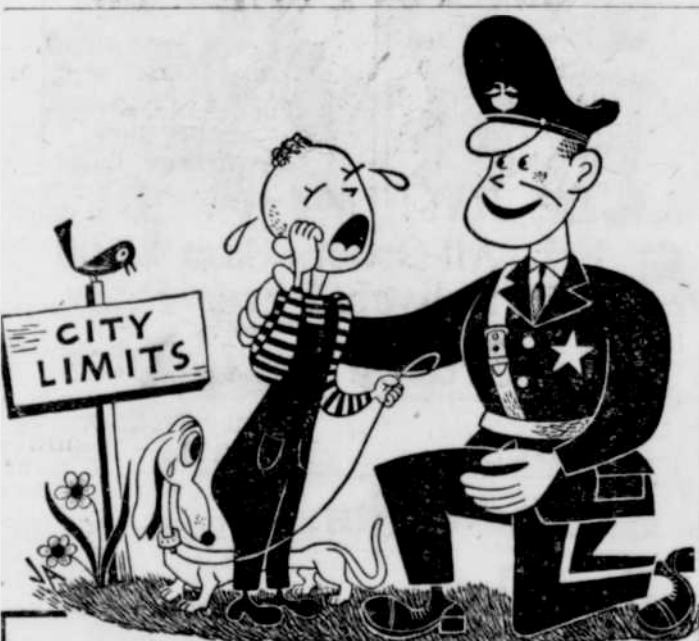
