HARTLEY REVEALS SCHOOL HISTORY

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\$140,566.80, including \$41,100 in the sinking fund that was set up three or four years ago. Mr. Hartley said, "We could raise the remainder by floating bonds, but the amount would not be enough to do what we would like to do. Our capacity to raise money is about the same as in pre-war days. There is some discussion that the five per cent may be applied to the full 100 per cent of value."

"We have a bonded indebtedness of \$45,500 so that we must subtract that from the amount we can raise, leaving a balance of \$90,000. We can exceed the six per cent limitation only by a vote of the people. We did that last year for the first time."

The superintendent discussed the recommendations of Dr. D. A. Amerson of the state department of education relative to a building program for Nyssa.

"I think the board has in mind a long time program and will keep that in mind as we go along," Mr. Hartley said. "We must determine the structure of the school organization. None of the types of organization are magical, but some are better than others for certain communities. Usually the organization dividing the grades into groups such as high school, junior high school and elementary school, and combinations thereof are more or less accidental."

"We could transport 15 pupils to the Arcadia school, but we have some opposition from parents. I don't know what we will do this spring to handle the influx of youngsters. We will probably have more transients this year."

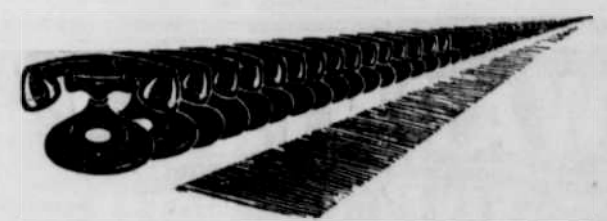
