GRUBS CAUSE BIG LIVESTOCK LOSSES

One of the greatest losses to livestock men is due to livestock insect parasite, George W. Bain, assistant county agent, said.

The cattle grubs alone cost the livestock industry of the United States approximately \$100,000,000 last year, according to a recent U. S. D. A. bulletin. The heel fly, adult of the grub, causes the cattle to run off weight as well as prevents their feeding properly. The movement of the grub through the muscle tissues of cattle causes an irritation that prevents a thrifty

gain. In addition to these two factors, the packers grade a carcass down that is marred with scars caused by grubs. Hides with five or more grub scars are classed as number 2.

Effective control of these parasites can be obtained by spraying. Seven and one-half pounds of rotenone in 100 gallons of water, applied with 400 pounds of pressure are the present recommendations, declares Bain. At least two sprayings are necessary, the first being about 30 days after the grubs appear in the back because it is at this time that they bore holes in the skin. Only when these holes are open can good kills be made.

The second spraying should be applied 30 days after the maximum numbers of grubs appear following the first operation. Bain expects the grubs to start appearing within a few weeks.

Ticks and lice also cost the producers millions of dollars each year. The loss from these two insects are due to irritation and blood loss. DDT at the rate of 8 pounds of 50 per cent wettable to 100 gallons of water applied with high pressure, gives best results says Bain. Although the maximum results are obtained by spraying as soon as the cattle and sheep come in off the range, some good would still come of the operation if the weather would warm up enough to allow spraying. It is a good practice to spray before turning out in the spring if you have been unable to spray in the fall.

STOCKMAN NAMED ON APPROPRIATIONS

Congressman Lowell Stockman of the second district of Oregon has been placed on the powerful appropriations committee of the house of representatives.

He is the first member of the house from Oregon ever to serve on the appropriations committee in all the years since 1859, when Oregon was admitted to the union and sent its first representatives to the 35th congress.

There were 90 applicants in the house for the eight positions which were open to republicans on the appropriations committee at this session of congress, and Congressman Stockman was assigned to this committee, even though other states with larger populations than Oregon had many more votes to support members from their own delegations.

CONTRIBUTIONS FOR SEALS ACCEPTABLE

Malheur county contributions to the Christmas seal sale to date amount to \$5881.53, according to Mrs. Jessie M. Fraser of Ontario, county seal chairman.

Although the county has "gone over the top", some people have failed to send in their contributions.

"Many of us promptly accepted the invitation last November to buy seals," Mrs. Fraser said. "A few of us intended to accept, but somehow we forgot to send in the money for our seals. Our negligence did not mean that we were not interested in the association or that we did not want it to continue its excellent work in preventing the spread of tuberculosis in our community. Far from it. We want the

work to go ahead. We simply forgot that the association cannot function unless we purchase the seals, the sale of which is used to support our health program.

"It still is not too late to answer the invitation of the health association. We can still participate in its community health program by sending in the money for our seals today."
