The native of Austria, who spoke at a meeting of the P. T. A. last week, thinks we should give more money to feed the starving in Europe and elsewhere and should have given 40 billion after the war to help reconstruct the war-torn countries of

Europe in order to develop goodwill toward this country.

We should do our part to alleviate distress, but attempting to buy goodwill is not the right method of assuring peace. We have tried that and we have miserably failed.

Many people have probably forgotten or never knew about the millions that were poured into the near east as social workers plastered the United States with placards of starving children two decades ago; about the millions sent to relieve the starving in China and the millions in food and clothing sent to Japan after her disastrous earthquakes, to say nothing of the billions that have been spent to relieve distress in the last few years. Yet, Marshall Tito of Yugoslavia accused the United States this week of giving food for political reasons.

The food, clothing and money must not have been appreciated or world events would not have developed as they have developed. We are continually accused of extending our philanthropy for ulterior reasons and until we prove our political honesty no amount of money we donate will bring world peace, which will ultimately be based on goodwill and understanding.

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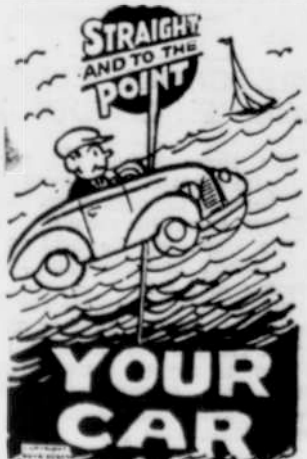
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
