Portland. Anyone wishing to donate a cane may leave it at the Trailways depot.

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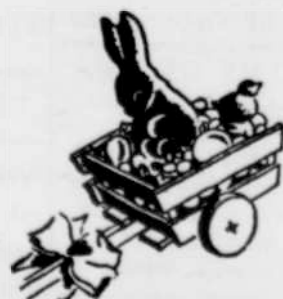
