IS WALLACE LOYALTY JUST THAT?

Loyalty and patriotism must be very elastic attributes.

One man stays home and works hard to support himself and his family, thankful for the privilege of living under a democratic form of government. Another man, or perhaps the same man, during time of war, goes to the four corners of the earth to fight for his country. But Henry Wallace goes to England and tells the world what a crooked, exploiting and imperialistic country he lives in, and he calls that patriotism.

If holding a man's country up to ridicule and detestation is loyalty, then loyalty is something that the average man cannot understand. However, we have a suspicion that the former vice president's tirades against the foreign policy

of the United States is due largely to ulterior motives. There are several reasons why Wallace dislikes President Truman, but that gives him no right to attack this country as an imperialistic nation.

Wallace claims that his motive in attacking his own country from the safety of England's shores is that he is attempting to promote peace. Permanent peace is based on goodwill and mutual understanding, so how could Wallace expect to promote peace by creating distrust of this country among the other nations of the world?

The former vice president has done this country a great injustice and when he returns to the protection of his native land he should be shunted into the political oblivion which he so justly deserves, but probably so thoroughly dislikes.
