Maurice Judd, Jr., George Scheimer and Stanley Hill enjoyed fishing on the lake above the Owyhee dam Saturday.

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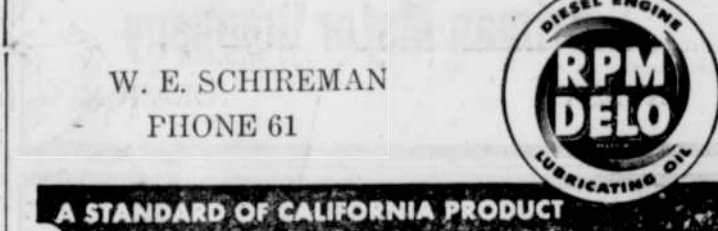

OFFICIAL NOTICE CREATING WEED CONTROL DISTRICT
BE IT RESOLVED, that Malheur County be, and the same is hereby declared to be and constitute a weed control district under the terms of Chapter 265 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1923, and amendments thereof, for the purpose of destroying and preventing the seeding and spread of noxious weeds and plants, and that the following weeds and plants are hereby determined and declared to be noxious weeds, to-wit:
Morning Glory, Russian Knap, California Puncture Vine, Canadian Thistle, White Top, Bull Thistle, and Milk Weed.
And be it further RESOLVED that the Clerk shall cause to be published in Malheur Enterprise, Eastern Oregon Observer, and Gate City Journal a notice of the formation of said weed control district, naming the weeds hereby declared to be noxious weeds, as provided by law.
And be it further RESOLVED, that Lee Pettet, be, and he is hereby appointed weed inspector, with all of the duties and authority conferred upon him as such by the laws of Oregon.
