Bulldogs Take County Pennant In Track Meet

Vale Is Second In Annual Event; Bob Church High Man

The Nyssa Bulldogs won the Malheur county track championship in one track meet held in Ontario last Saturday, with a total of 48 points.

The Vale Vikings placed second and Ontario and Adrian took third and fourth places, respectively.

Nyssa scored first places in the 200-yard low hurdles, 880-yard run, javelin, discus, and 220-yard dash. Bob Church was high point man with 12 points to his credit. He won first places in the discus and javelin and third place in the shotput. Kay Christensen was second high point man with a first place in the 200-yard hurdles, second in the 200-yard dash and fourth in the discus.

Other Nyssa winners were Tommy Bates, first in the 880-yard run and third in the 200-yard hurdles; Dick Iseri, second in the broadjump and fourth in the 200-yard hurdles; Jim Takami, first in the 220-yard dash and second in the 100-yard dash; Cecil Bair, third in the 480-yard run and fourth in the 440-yard dash; Norman Garner, fourth in the javelin; Merlin Anderson, fourth in the 120-yard hurdles, and John Bartholoma, who picked up a point in the relay.

The team was composed of 10 men, nine who figured in the scoring column. Coach Kinsey Keveren said. The Bulldogs will appear in competition again Saturday, May 3 in the Snake river valley meet to be held in Weiser. The following Saturday they will go to La Grande to participate in the district meet.

No Objections Submitted On Street Program

Council Agrees To Level Lots For Free Parking

Inasmuch as there were no objections offered to the proposed street improvement program at a hearing held in the city hall last Friday night, the city council is proceeding with plans for making an assessment and calling for bids for the entire street improvement program.

After the hearing, the council took a second reading on the ordinance adopting plans and specifications for the improvements. An election will be held on a proposed bond issue to pay for paving of intersections, which is part of the street improvement program. The date of the election will be set at the next council meeting.

A committee was appointed to make a survey of the proposed curb cuts for driveways on Main street. Fred Bracken, George Hennehan and George Sallee have completed the survey.

City Manager E. K. Burton has already started field work for the street improvements.

The council agreed to use city equipment to level lots which the Nyssa chamber of commerce has recommended for use as parking lots, at least during the summer when the street improvements are underway. The chamber committee consisting of B. B. Lienkaemper, Carlos Buchner and Calvin Wilson, are securing the consent of property owners to use certain lots in the business section for free parking.

The council authorized the employment of A. A. Durand and Son of Walla to pump sand out of well No. 2 on Third street. The work, estimated to cost \$600, has already been started.

The steer, bought from John Stringer of Nyssa for 30 cents a pound, will be given away by the Sage and Saddle club of Ontario at the club's spring rodeo in May.

As a sort of curiosity, the steer was run through the sale at Ontario and packers bid the price up to \$31.40 or a total of \$642 for the steer.

Dr. Spaeth Finds "Fun In Music"

Speaking on the subject of "Finding Fun In Music", Dr. Sigmund Spaeth declared at a meeting of the Knife and Fork club in the Moore hotel in Ontario last Thursday night, that through the radio, phonograph records and motion pictures the ordinary people are learning to appreciate the work of Tschichowsky, Chopin, Beethoven and other artists whose music has become permanent.

Dr. Spaeth, known as a "tune detective," who is a radio commentator of note, discussed and demonstrated the historic trends of tunes. After discussing a certain composition, he played sketches of it on the piano to illustrate his point and then turned to other tunes.

Through the new mediums, the doctor said, "We have an opportunity to reach the potential music lovers of the land. That is the encouraging thing about our music life today."

One of Tschichowsky's songs has 16 arrangements, but when people hear the original they appreciate it more because the test of good music is time.

"We are getting rid of the old snobbery and hypocrisy connected with music," Dr. Spaeth said. "Music is not just an art, it is something to be enjoyed. I refuse to put music on a pedestal, so people are apt to say 'music is over my head'. The best contact between music and the common people is a tune or melody. My definition of music is 'organization of sound toward beauty'. The tune lover of music is affected in the foot, the heart and the head, physically, emotionally and intellectually. When you enjoy all three you are getting something out of music. You can organize sound in three ways, rhythm, melody and harmony, then finally tone color and form."

"Music is based on patterns, which are filled with melody and harmony." Dr. Spaeth demonstrated on the piano the difference in songs with the same rhythmic pattern, but with different harmony and melody. It is by the melody that people recognize music.

The speaker discussed many compositions built on two tones, the sound of the co-coo. Beethoven wrote a Turkish march on two notes. The start of the Fifth Symphony puts rhythm into two tones of melody. Many modern composers have used two tones for some of their most popular tunes. The three tones of the bugle are found in "The Blue Danube". Reversed, "you have start of the 'Star Spangled Banner', Dr. Spaeth said. The three tones are found in many national anthems.

"It is very logical that when you start with 'How Dry I Am', you end up with 'Sweet Adeline', which use the same tones," the doctor said.

Tone color is hard to illustrate without a combination of instruments. Dr. Spaeth said. He added that "form is getting the best results with the least amount of effort, the same as in athletics."

The Nyssa high school baseball team split even on its last two conference games, losing to Ontario 9 to 4 last Friday at Ontario and defeating Vale on the Vale field Tuesday of this week by a score of 3 to 0.

The Bulldogs will play Adrian here Friday for their last game of the year. Ontario defeated Adrian Tuesday at Ontario 17 to 1 to clinch the Malheur county title. The Tigers, who were undefeated in conference play, will meet the winner on the Idaho side for the Snake River Valley conference title and will play Baker or LaGrande for the right to go to the state tournament.

In the Ontario game, Nyssa registered 13 errors, accounting for several of the Tiger runs. Ontario made only one error. The Tigers outbatted the Bulldogs 8 to 5.

The Tigers took the lead in the second inning with two runs. Nyssa scored three runs in the third on three hits and a walk. Ontario went ahead again in the third inning with four runs, made another in the fourth and one in the fifth. Nyssa scored one tally in the seventh.

In the Vale contest, Nyssa scored its first run in the second inning. Holcomb walked and Itamura hit a triple, scoring Holcomb. Itamura "died" on third base. The other two runs came in the fifth.
