SCHOOL IMPROVEMENTS NEEDED

The rapid growth of Nyssa has placed taxpayers of this community in the position of having to pay for more extensive facilities for education of their youngsters.

The school board and members of the building committee have determined that an additional four rooms for grade school youngsters and repair and improvement of the present building will be necessary by the time school opens in the fall, if a so-called double shift is to be avoided. There is absolutely no hope of avoiding a double shift without the addition of four more rooms. This is not the desire of teachers and administrators who want better facilities, but the studied opinion of business men and farmers who are charged with responsibility for the future development of the school system.

The school was terribly crowded this past year and an increase of 150 in enrollment is anticipated for the 1947-48 term.

Under the double shift system, a child attends school only part of each day, either in the morning or afternoon, and of course he

does not have all of the advantages that he would receive under a normal system. Another bad feature of the plan is that more teachers are required, adding greater expense to the list of disadvantages.

In addition to the four rooms that are needed, the school district plans to repair the outer walls of the building which are deteriorating very rapidly. Seepage and other factors are causing the mortar between the lower layers of bricks to disintegrate. Other improvements will be made, if the money is provided in a bond issue to be voted upon by taxpayers Saturday, May 31.

The school district has \$51,000 in the bank for building construction and improvements, but an additional \$40,000 is needed for the project, expected to cost approximately \$90,000.

RULES GIVEN ON CHILDREN'S WORK

The sugar act requires that deductions be made from payments applied for under the sugar beet and sugar cane programs if child labor is employed under certain conditions, Glen L. Hutchinson, chairman of the county AAA committee, announced today. The types of cases where a deduction will be made and the rates of deduction are as follows:

1. \$10 for each day or part of a day on which a child under 14 years of age has worked in the production, cultivation, or harvesting of the crop.
2. \$10 for each day or part of

a day on which a child under 14 and 16 years of age has worked for more than 8 hours in any one day in the production, cultivation, or harvesting of the crop.

"These deductions do not apply to labor performed by children of a producer who has an interest in the crop of 40 percent or more. In applying for payment under the sugar act a producer must certify that the child labor provisions have been complied with and that proper deductions have been made. It is the producer's responsibility to obtain proof of the age of any child employed on the sugar beet (or cane) crop.

"As for previous crops, the secretary of agriculture has determined minimum wage rates to be paid by producers in qualifying for payments. Until the laborers have been paid in full, a producer will not be eligible to receive a sugar act payment. In applying for a payment under the sugar act, a producer must certify that all labor has been paid in full and at rates not less than those provided in the determination.

"The committee, Mr. Hutchinson declared, has been directed to check more closely regarding compliance with the labor provisions of the sugar program of 1947 as compared with recent years."
