(Continued from Page One) value we are liable to be misled and possibly 'sold down the river.' Our social, economic and government organizations have defects, but that is no reason we should throw out the organizations. It is necessary to have reason and not prejudice on the throne. If we are to live and survive, we must welcome trained intelligence and brains wherever we find them. If you are interested in preserving our country, you cannot neglect to take an interest in government. The future of our government lies in the groups of students like the group we have here. The challenge is to the brave, to the strong, to the ambitious and to the intelligent. I am sure each of you is ready to accept the challenge."

The program was opened with the prelude and procession played by the high school band, followed by prayer by Rev. C. L. Callahan.

In the salutatory, Doris Beers pointed out that the students had gained not only formal education but had learned to make friends.

"We who have watched the progress of this community from the time we were in the first grade can appreciate our education. Your money, interest and time have made the schools possible. We wish to sincerely thank you for the opportunity you have provided us and the support you have given our activities. We welcome you tonight to our first stepping out."

Alice Wada, the valedictorian, stated that "We ourselves are the only ones who can solve our problems. To overcome our handicaps will require initiative and courage. Wherever we are we will endeavor to uphold the principles that we have been taught."

BEET THINNING WELL UNDERWAY

Approximately 119,000 acres of sugar beets have been planted in Idaho, Oregon and Utah by farmers who grow beets for the Amalgamated Sugar company. H. A. Benning, president of the company, announced. This marks an increase of some 23,000 acres over the 1946 planting.

Growers in the Boise valley lead the planting with about 73,000 acres. The Idaho district which includes the Twin Falls, Burley and Rupert areas, follows with 37,000 acres and the Utah district, including Cache and Weber counties, trails with 8500 acres.

Beet thinning is well under way in Idaho and Oregon and there are approximately 2500 Mexican nationals working in beet fields in the three states, according to Mr. Benning. The thinning will not be

completed until late June.

During the summer months the Amalgamated's six factories at Burley, Rupert, Twin Falls, and Nampa, Idaho; Nyssa, Oregon and Lewiston, Utah will be reconditioned and improved for the processing campaign, which will begin in late September. Several of the beet receiving stations will also be renovated and enlarged.
