15,000 EXPECTED TO ATTEND REGATTA

All available transportation facilities and concessioners were geared this week to serve an anticipated crowd of 15,000 spectators at the championship Lake Lowell regatta, 10 miles west of Nampa, Sunday, June 1, when America's No. 1 motor speed boats will compete in the northwest's biggest race.

Arrangements are being made for local bus companies to provide direct transportation from Boise, Nampa and Caldwell to the lakeshore, according to Evert Dobbs, Nampa, race chairman for the Idaho Water Sports association which is co-sponsoring the regatta with the Boise Lions club. Advance ticket agencies were established this week in Nampa, Caldwell, Emmett, Boise, Ontario, Payette, Weiser and other key points in the 10 southwestern Idaho counties.

Dobbs said that state and county law enforcement agencies have joined forces with the sponsors in preparing to handle traffic, parking and policing of the crowd to make access to and departure from the race site quick and convenient for motorists.

POTATO PROGRAM DEADLINE NEARS

In order to clarify the 1947 potato price support program according to information received by the local AAA office thus far, Glen L. Hutchinson, chairman of the county committee, announced several important points of the program today as follows:

1. Growers must comply with 1947 individual farm potato acreage goals.

2. Price support will be restricted

to potatoes produced by eligible growers and which meet definite quality standards.

3. All growers, early and late, will be required to make application for a "certificate of eligibility". They will declare before harvest the maximum quantity of potatoes which they estimate will be produced by them in the county which will qualify for price support and will pay a nominal service fee on potatoes so declared.

4. No grower will be eligible who plants potatoes on land officially designated by state or federal agency as unfit for potato production because of disease or insect infestation.

5. Growers who plant less than three acres, and therefore have no specifically assigned acreage goal, but who wish to be eligible for price support, are required to so notify the county committee prior to June 5 for early and intermediate potatoes and July 15 for late potatoes to permit determination of their compliance with the small farm goal.

6. Growers may be required to enter into written agreements with the department covering such matters as acreage goal compliance, withholding from market and disposition of designated qualities and sizes as directed by the department, and quantitative limitation of offerings to the department by appropriate time periods beginning about October 1.

Mr. Hutchinson wished to emphasize that small growers producing 2.9 acres or less must declare their acreage at the county office before June 5 or July 15 in order to be eligible for support prices on their potatoes.
