

Adrian To Get U. S. Buildings

Through the veterans on-the-job training program, the Adrian high school has been allocated a building program that will amount to between \$30,000 and \$40,000. The Adrian school will be allowed 5000 square feet of government surplus buildings on the school grounds.

One of the buildings, 25 by 60 feet, will be equipped for a motion picture projection room, class room and music room. It will also have a basement with sufficient storage space for school equipment. Another building will be 70 by 25 feet. It will be used for additional shop facilities under the agricultural training program. A 25 by 40 foot building will be used for a class room and office. The government erects and equips these buildings according to government specifications at no cost to the district. The program is designed primarily for colleges, but because of Adrian's early application it is to receive the benefits. In addition to the buildings, the school has received between \$5000 and \$6000 worth of office and shop equipment. An architect is now working on plans for the frame buildings.

County Budget Set At \$362,972

court and county budget committee for the year 1947-48.

The county set the amount that may be raised by taxation within the six per cent limitation at \$244,622. Revenue from other sources is estimated at \$118,350, making a grand total of \$362,972.

Judge Irwin Troxell said the budget will be formally adopted late in June after its publication in a county newspaper.

An additional sum of \$2500 was appropriated for the assessor's office for the employment of four deputy assessors during three months of the year. One will assess livestock in outlying sections and the others will operate in Nyssa, Ontario and Vale.

Most of the other county offices will receive the same amount of money as this year. However, the budget for the county health office will be reduced \$500 as the state now will pay 35 per cent of the expenses of that office. Because of changes in appropriations, the budget for the county public welfare office was decreased \$600.

The board appropriated \$20,000 for the sinking fund for a new court house building, bringing the total in the fund to \$76,000.

Under a ruling issued by Attorney General George Neuner, the board tentatively appropriated \$35,000 for salaries for the four justices of the peace in Malheur county. The justices are to receive a salary in an amount based on fees collected in 1946, plus 20 per cent. Under the present system the justices receive a percentage of the fees collected.

Members of the budget board are Dale Garrison of Nyssa, chairman; Fred W. Chytraus of Ontario, secretary, and Glen High of Vale.

BLACKABY NAMED HEALTH TREASURER

At a recent meeting of the executive board of the Malheur County Public Health association the board accepted the resignation of Arthur Atherton as treasurer. William E. Blackaby was appointed treasurer by the president, Ted Berreth, to serve the remainder of the term.

When the association was organized on July 10, 1935 Joe Dyer was elected treasurer. Mr. Dyer kept the office until March, 1938, when Arthur Atherton was elected. Pressure of business caused Mr. Atherton to resign. Mr. Blackaby's father, Earl Blackaby, has served as county chairman of the finance committee since the association was organized in 1935.
