CREAMERY JOINS IN CELEBRATION OF DAIRY MONTH

The Farmers Co-operative creamery of Payette, which operates in this territory, is celebrating National Dairy month in co-operation with other dairy interests, according to R. C. Hammond, general manager of the concern.

The manager of the concern, which has branches at Ontario and Cambridge, said that the purpose of the month is to focus attention of the public on the important part dairy products play in the business, health and well being of the nation.

As a part of its observance of National Dairy month, the creamery concern is publishing advertisements in the newspapers in its territory, including the Gate City Journal. The advertisements give figures on the tremendous amount

of milk and dairy products that are produced in the United States, the part they play in health and the vast income they provide for the producers.

Mr. Hammond also stated that the local creamery organization is celebrating the month this year with the realization of a past year of successful operation and prospect for a brighter future.

During the past year he said the creamery has called in all its A and B stock and has also retired all 1935 equities. It also had one of its largest years in volume of milk handled.

For the future he said prospects look bright for the local concern. The section is a natural dairy area as feed grows prolifically here. More and more producers are becoming acquainted with the advantages of belonging to a cooperative concern to the point where the co-operative creamery here has the volume to compete with other concerns of its kind in other sections of the Northwest.
