Oregon counties in which cattle raising is conducted are in the state brand inspection area created under the 1947 brand inspection code, which applies to the movement of cattle, horses and mules.

Chief Machinist Mate S. G. Thacker, USN, recruiter in charge of the Boise navy recruiting station, announced today that effective immediately, young men between the ages of 17 and 30 may now enlist in the regular United States navy for a minimum period of three years. Previously the term of service was four years. The navy official further pointed out that men with previous naval service who re-enlist within three months from date of discharge may do so for either two, three, four, or six years, at the option of the applicant concerned.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank J. Pike of Adrian visited friends in Vale Sunday.

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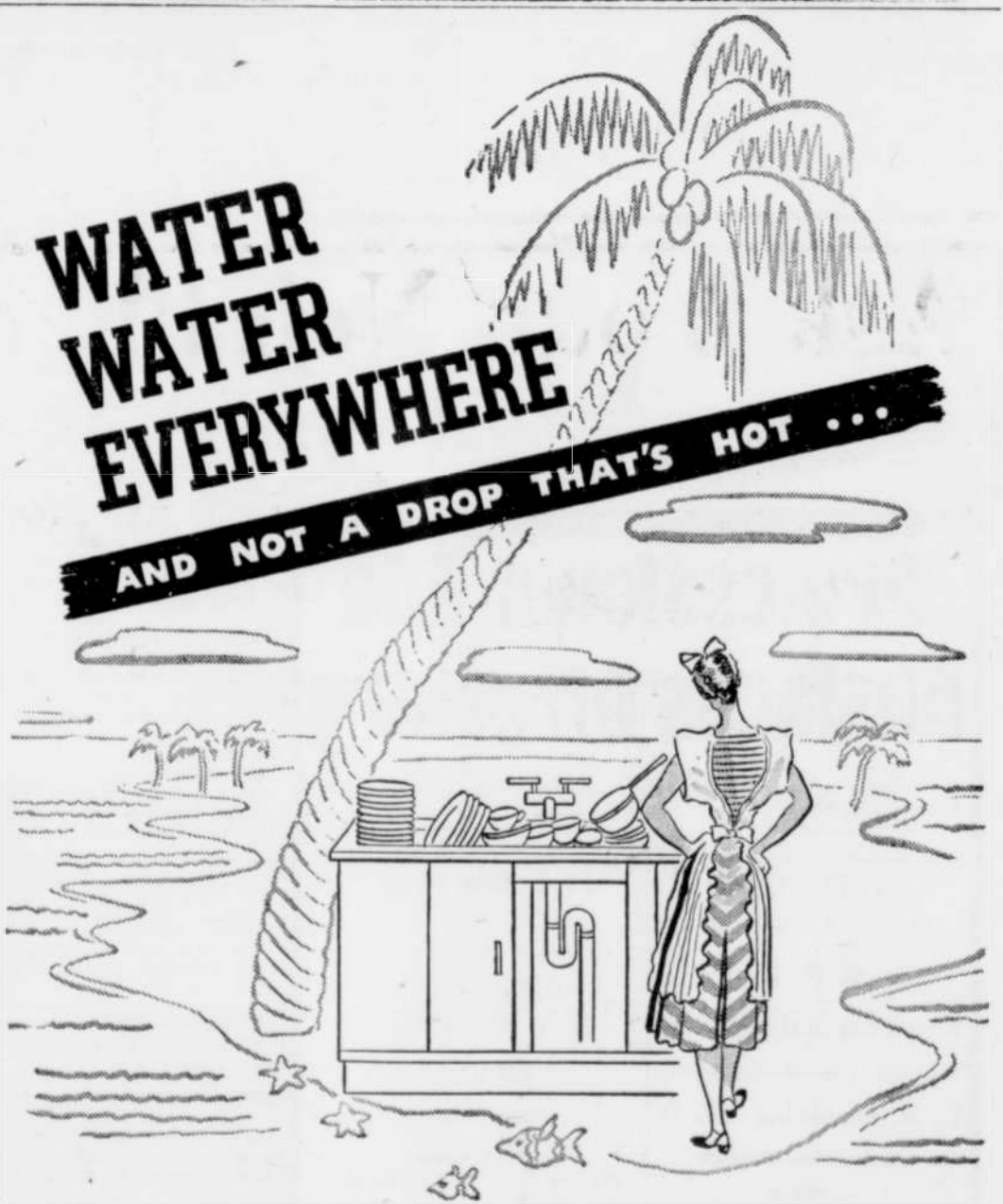
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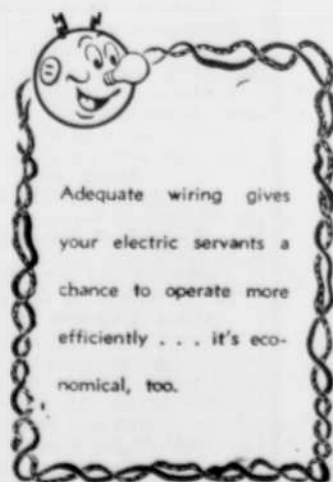
