

LIMITATION ON BUILDING IS SET

A. J. Wahl, district construction manager of the non-residential construction division of the office of the housing expediter, has been informed by his Washington, D. C. headquarters that the Wolcott bill, H.R. 3203, became federal law June 30.

Under the terms of this bill the housing expediter, Frank R. Creedon, has issued a construction limitation regulation effective June 30, 1947, which controls construction repair, remodeling, alteration, conversion or reconstruction of any

building or structure or part thereof, if the building or structure will be used for amusement or recreational purposes. Federal control of non-residential construction for other purposes was removed by the passage of the Wolcott bill.

All businesses operated for recreation or amusement of patrons whether privately or public owned are controlled by the bill. The list does not include buildings on fairgrounds owned and operated by the state or counties and exhibition or exposition buildings municipally owned, which are not operated for profit.

The total amount that may be expended for the entire construction of a building or all of the repair, reconstruction, alteration, conversion or remodeling of any building without a federal permit is \$500, if the building will be used for any amusement or recreational purpose. The cost of all materials, labor and plumbing, heating, lighting and air conditioning must be included in this amount, and also cost of bars, bowling alleys, and marquees whenever they are fastened to the building with nails, screws or bolts, or are attached to the plumbing, or are directly attached to the lighting system (except to an existing plug in), or are cemented to the structure.

The district OHE compliance division will continue to function. However, applications for construction should be sent to the office of the housing expediter, Washington, D. C. Plans may be obtained from the area rent control office, the OHE BARD building, Boise, Idaho.

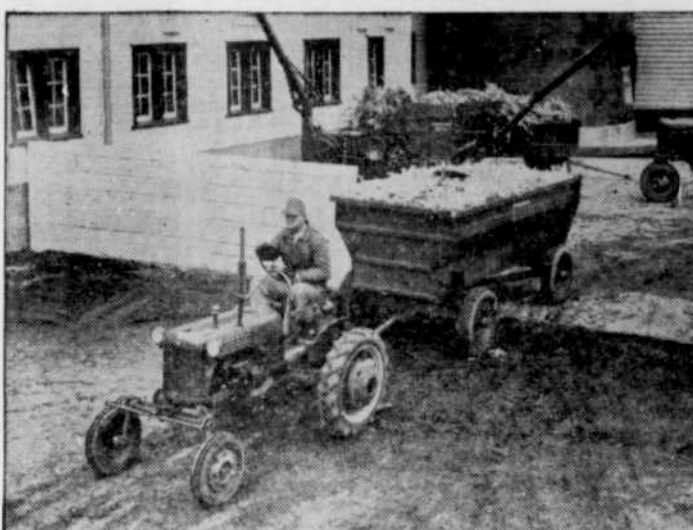
