Oregon Chest Is Explained Here

Howard C. Johnson of Portland told the members of the Nyssa Lions club at a luncheon last Monday noon that 2992 persons were cared for in Oregon institutions helped by the Oregon Chest last year.

These persons were cared for in 1946 at a cost of approximately \$740,000, which was provided through taxation, individual contributions and endowments. Forty-three per cent of the money is raised by contributions by individuals each year during a financial campaign, which will be held in October this year. Nine organizations, such as the Waverley baby home, Catholic charities and Oregon Protective society, are benefited by the contributions. Most of the persons benefited are babies, young women and mothers and their children without means of support.

During last year when 19 children from Malheur county received care in the institutions, residents of this county contributed \$1067.

Mr. Johnson, who is public relations director of a public utilities company in Portland, is giving three months of his time to the work of the Oregon Chest this year.

School Election Results Shown

Results of the recent balloting held in Malheur county for election of members of the rural school board and the non-high school board were announced last week by Mrs. Kathryn Claypool, county school superintendent.

View, Willowcreek, Grouse Creek, Jamieson, White Settlement and Lincoln, Ed Oakes; zone four, Harper, Westfall, Bully Creek, Jun-tura, Riverside, Owyhee dam, Bon-ita, Rose Creek, Grove, Sand Hollow and Westfall Union high school, George Russell; zone five, Rock-ville, Jordan Valley, Sheaville, Dan-ner, Cow Creek, Arock, McDer-mitt, Oregon Canyon, Wade, Lower Bend, Ridgeview and Follyfarm, S. K. Skinner.

Ed Oakes, Ironside, was elected to a five-year term on the non-high board to succeed himself, and William Stewart, Ontario, was elected to a two-year term to complete the term of L. I. Kinney, Ontario, who resigned.
