HUGHES WINS BY DEFAULT

It appears that Howard Hughes, noted plane builder who is involved in a congressional investigation of his wartime contracts, and Hughes' publicity director, John Myers, have out-publicized the publicity-minded committee.

Senator Brewster, chairman of the general investigation committee has gone on a vacation to Maine and Sen. Ferguson, sub-committee chairman conducting the hearing, has postponed the fiasco until fall. Hughes said Brewster called off the investigation because he was "too cowardly" to continue their personal feud.

Hughes administered a barrage of verbal punches against Brewster before the plane builder was called to appear as a witness and has appeared to hold the upper hand throughout the investigation. The main charge that was at least partly substantiated was that Hughes spent too much money entertaining government officials, which is as much of a reflection on the government as on the entertainer.

In an attempt to try to prove his innocence of the charges leveled at him by Hughes, Senator Brewster volunteered to testify as a "private citizen". He wept to think that Hughes would accuse him of offering to cancel the investigation if Hughes would agree to merger of his Trans-World airlines with Pan-American airways.

When senators and other government officials become so involved in business affairs, shady deals and high pressure salesmanship that they cannot conduct an investigation without being themselves accused of misconduct they had better forget about their worthless investigations and step from their government positions. If there is only slight suspicion of their activities, the confidence of the people is shaken.

Now, Hughes is gloating over his victory, which he might or might not have secured in an honest, conscientious investigation of his contracts totaling forty million dollars. At least his innocence or guilt could probably have been proved in a sane investigation.
