JOHN DAY HIGHWAY WORK IS ASKED

Delegates from Jefferson, Crook, Wheeler, Grant and Malheur counties assembled in John Day to organize a citizens committee promoting the improvement of the highway connection through central Oregon from Portland, through Madras, Prineville, John Day and Vale.

A luncheon meeting was held and representatives from the various counties each pointed out wherein the state of Oregon and their agricultural and business interests could be better served by a more direct and improved route through central Oregon to Portland connecting that Oregon seaport with the vast central Oregon agricultural and forest areas.

Lloyd Ogilvie was elected president of the committee, with vice president representatives from each county as follows: Guy Wade, Jefferson county; Judge A. R. Bowman, Crook county; Bud Spoo, Wheeler county; Herman Oliver, Grant county; and Frank Colise, Malheur county.

Ranchers from areas pointed out how inadequate highway facilities resulted in cattle shrinkage at shipment destinations. Representatives in the state legislature in the areas advised the group on the attitude of the state legislature toward this additional highway construction. It was pointed out that this improvement of the John Day-Warm Springs highway would involve a total mileage from Portland to Boise of 396 miles; that other existing connections involved additional mileage of 116 miles and that this saving of mileage would mean greater income and a more rapid delivery service of agricultural and forest products to the principal market areas.
