circle design, set together with pink material.

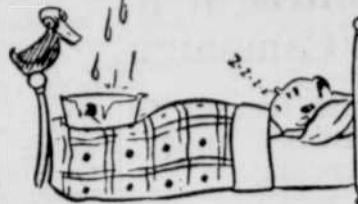
