HOSPITAL TO HELP ANY IN DISTRICT

"Our district memorial hospital campaign is not in competition with the efforts of any other community to obtain better and more adequate hospital accommodations," stated Arvel Gaild, associate general chairman of the memorial hospital campaign, who stated, "the citizens of the Boise and the Snake river valleys should be protected by ample hospital facilities. Wherever necessary to protect the lives and health of the people, an increase in the number of beds and modern equipment should be encouraged in each area or district to be served by a hospital."

"No longer can the citizens of one district be expected to provide hospital facilities for citizens of other remote areas in addition to affording hospital protection for their own people. For this reason the citizens of this area desire to be self-reliant and relieve neighboring communities from the burden of taking care of our people. To accomplish this, the citizens of this area are now engaged in financing a hospital that is planned to serve the residents of the Nyssa area, Nu-Acres, Apple Valley, Owyhee and Big Bend districts and Adrian, Parma, Wilder, Roswell, and their surrounding communities."

"The modern design of the hospital will permit adding additional beds and operating facilities according to the future needs of the district. The initial unit will have major and minor operating rooms, a maternity wing, modern laboratories, and up-to-date X-rays—all the latest equipment of medical and surgical science, the equipment alone to cost \$40,000."

"Our great productive valleys will have a constant increase in population. Hospital centers or districts are necessary in each area for protection of the people. We therefore wish to encourage all other centers or districts to enlarge the present facilities, or build new hospitals in order to make our valleys safe and desirable places in which to live."
