ELMER STRADLEY WINS FUR AWARD

Elmer B. Stradley of Nyssa is a winner of a daily award for correct pelt handling in the 19th national fur show conducted by the raw fur marketing service of Sears, Roebuck and Co.

A carefully handled pelt brought this trapper one of the \$3 daily awards, as a result of being judged one of the three best handled skins among all pelts received at Sears raw fur marketing station in Seattle. This pelt is now eligible to consideration for one of the major awards, including the \$1,000 first award, to be selected at the final judging, which will be held in April.

This season's 19th national fur show awards again total \$7,500 in cash, including 918 daily awards, 10 major awards, topped by an eagerly sought-after \$1,000 first award, plus 12 sectional awards for complete fur shipments. All awards are for pelt-handling only, not kind or value of skin. Every pelt shipped to Sears, during the term of the fur show, is automatically considered for one or more awards.
