

NEW POLIO CASES EMPHASIZE NEED OF MORE PREPAREDNESS

The report of 11 new cases of polio in Oregon in January, unusually high incidence for this time of year, is an incentive for county March of Dimes volunteers to complete their quotas and an emphasis on the need for continued preparedness, Dr. E. T. Hedlund, state March

of Dimes chairman, reported this week. Dr. Harold M. Erickson of the state board of health explained that the case report is higher this month than it has been for any January since 1933 when 23 cases were reported just after the 1927 epidemic when Oregon had 290 polio victims. Clatsop, Clackamas, and Malheur counties have two cases each, and Multnomah, Lincoln, Washington, Umatilla, and Klamath have reported one case each.
