ber of the class. Both Miss McGee and Miss Snader will remain in working at St. Anthony hospital.

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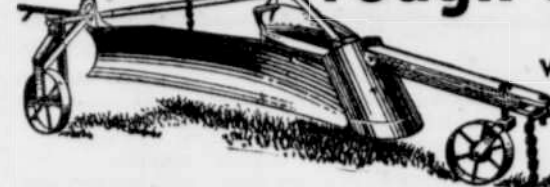
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
