SUNSET VALLEY, March 22—

Twenty-six farm women attended an all-day meeting at the Jim Langley home Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Pete Wilson and Mrs. Jim Langley were co-hostesses. The project work for the day was the actual boxing of inner springs in the cushions of chairs and davenport.

Work was under the guidance of Miss Miriam Black, county home demonstration agent.

Twenty-four women signed as members, organizing into a group forming a home extension unit to carry on the county and state home extension program, furthering the

interests of the rural women. Officers elected for the newly-formed extension unit are Mrs. Kenneth McDonald, chairman; Mrs. Lyman Pomeroy, vice chairman, and Mrs. Howard Connaughy, secretary-treasurer.

The date of the regular meeting will be on the second Wednesday of each month of the eight months from October through May. No meetings will be held during the busy summer months. This work is open to all interested rural home-makers.

Harry Sandquist, county agricultural agent, will be present and assist. The wooden forms used for this demonstration will later be available to those in the community who wish to use them. It will require an all-day meeting for the completion of the task, beginning about 9 or 9:30 a.m. All farmers and their wives who are interested in septic tank construction are invited to attend.

BRIDGFORD WILL PAY MORE MONEY

Payments to growers in 1948 will be nearly three times as large as last year's payment, according to George Doherty, new general manager of the Bridgford company's frozen food division at Ontario.

Seven hundred thousand dollars has been budgeted for raw product payments this year as compared with \$280,000 actually spent in 1947.

As indications of its increased raw product shipment, the Bridgford company stands ready to take 60 new acres of asparagus, 80 to 130 acres of strawberries, 750 acres of lima beans, and 3,000 acres of corn. It was also announced that a very successful season of pea contracting in the valley had been completed, with about 1300 acres signed up.

Mr. Doherty called attention to figures on last year's operations, which showed that strawberry growers earned as high as \$170 per acre, despite the facts that it was their first crop year and that unusually heavy rains destroyed many berries.

Referring to asparagus, Mr. Doherty said, "This is one of the country's outstanding producing areas for this crop. Yields in two years can be expected to be about one ton per acre, and in four to five years, three or more tons per acre. Our asparagus contracts are written for 10 years and we pay each year

the legitimate canners' price at net in the Yakima valley. Last year this was 7 1/2 cents per pound."

Mr. Doherty also commented on the company's research and development program, through which he hopes to introduce new crops and new varieties of present crops to the valley. He expressed the intention of eventually running the plant at high volume throughout the year, by processing additional products such as apples and frozen poultry. "We feel that the Ontario plant, one of the world's largest for quick freezing and canning, can make a real contribution to the economic security of the valley," Mr. Doherty concluded.
