CONDITION OF TWO BRIDGES IS SHOWN

(Continued From Page 1) Between the two states was fair when made and is a fair agreement today. He sees no reason why it would not be fair for years to come in the future. The trouble is that Idaho has done such a poor job of maintenance that we find the bridges almost unusable to Payette and Weiser today and the Oregon farmers in their areas are threatened with financial loss.

"It is recommended that in the immediate future the Oregon highway commission meet with the Idaho public works commission with the express purpose of providing adequate and safe bridges at Payette and Weiser. Should this fail, it is recommended that Malheur

county in Oregon, together with the cities of Payette and Weiser and with the governing bodies of Payette and Washington counties appeal to the governors of Oregon and Idaho for help in solving this problem."

After giving the history of the development of U. S. highway 95 in Idaho, Morgan said "Today it is the request of a united Malheur county that an alternate route of U. S. 95 be designated from Weiser across Snake river bridge into Oregon, south through Ontario, Nyssa, Adrian, through Succor creek canyon to Jordan Valley and McDermitt. The road is all constructed except from a point approximately 15 miles north of Jordan Valley. This is a distance of 30 miles and would place the Weiser bridge on a federal highway, making federal aid available for maintenance and construction of a new bridge. This would be of great value in solving the bridge problem at this point."

NEW BANK MAN IS FARM SPECIALIST

Edwin F. Knettle has been appointed agricultural field representative for the First National Bank of Portland, to serve in Eastern Oregon, announces Frank N. Belgrano, Jr., president. The area in which Knettle will work includes Malheur and part of Baker counties, with headquarters at Nyssa.

Knettle received his master's degree in agricultural economics from Washington State college this spring. He earned his bachelor's degree at the same school in 1942, and in the years between 1942 and 1946 was with the air force in the Pacific theatre, coming out of service as a captain.

"Increase of qualified personnel is only one phase of expanded farm field service planned this year for Oregon by First National bank," said Belgrano. "Our representatives have in the past been much concerned with land development and conservation practices. These still will be emphasized, but representatives will also engage in as many other agricultural programs as possible."

Knettle's background includes several years experience on his father's wheat ranch near Pomeroy, Washington, and on his own farm in the foothills of the Green mountains in the same region. While earning his masters degree, Knettle also was employed as research assistant in agricultural economics at Washington State college. In this work, he specialized in studies of wheat, but covered a variety of other crops as well.

Knettle's wife and two daughters will follow him to Nyssa as soon as a home can be located.

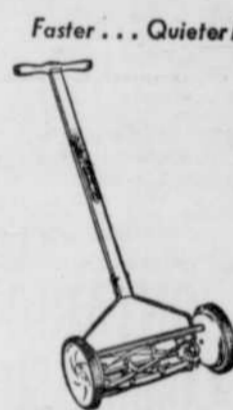
