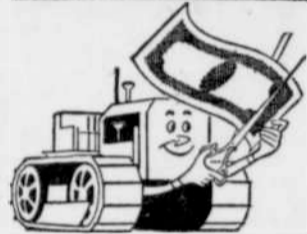

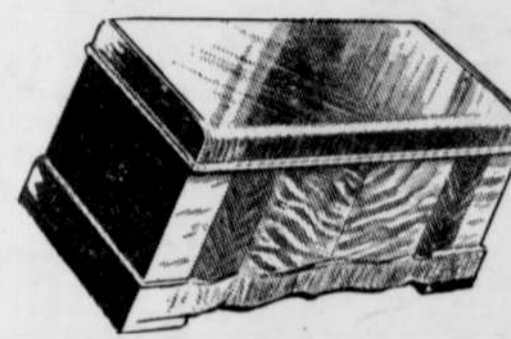

Notice To Beet Growers

At the present time about 62,500 acres of sugar beets have been contracted in the Nyssa-Nampa District.

The 1948 wage scale set by the Department of Agriculture for sugar beets is as follows:

- The minimum hourly rate is: 1. Blocking, thinning or weeding: 60 cents per hour. 2. All harvesting work: 65 cents per hour.

Permitted reductions for workers between 14-16 years of age: These rates may be reduced by not more than one-third.

For work performed on a piece rate basis: Blocking and thinning fields planted with segmented seed: \$13 per acre.

Whole seed: \$15. First hoeing: \$5. Each subsequent hoeing or weeding: \$4 per acre.

Permitted Reductions: The above thinning rates may be reduced not in excess of \$3 per acre for fields that are machine blocked prior to thinning.

Wide row planting: First hoeing—following hoe thinning (no finger thinning) \$6 per acre. The above thinning and hoeing rates may be reduced, but not in excess of percentages in accordance with row spacings as follows:

Hoe thinning (no finger thinning): \$8 per acre. This rate applicable to fields where the producer does not require the worker to finger thin because of machine blocking, machine thinning, low rate of seeding or other labor saving practice.

Cross Cultivation: In an instance where cross cultivation is performed prior to hoeing or weeding, the specified first hoeing rate may be reduced not in excess of \$1 per acre and the specified subsequent hoeing or weeding rate may be reduced not in excess of 50 cents per acre.

The rates for pulling, topping and loading for this district are slightly lower than the rates for 1947.

The rate for 20 tons and over per acre is \$1.55 per ton and graduates up to \$2.25 per ton for beets averaging 7 tons per acre.

Thinning time is here and we urge all growers to use mechanical equipment in their thinning operation whenever possible.
