## GUERNSEY HEIFER SOLD AT JEROME

Sweetheart of Sugar City, daughter of Twin Springs Joy, a guernsey owned by Francis Hight of route 2, Nyssa, was sold Saturday at the Idaho state heifer sale held at Jerome for 4-H boys and girls and Future Farmers. The heifer sold for \$325.

Twin Springs Joy, announced last week as having made a record of 8008 pounds of milk and 452 pounds of butterfat, was given by Sears-Roebuck company to the agriculture department of the Nyssa high school and the ag. department gave the guernsey heifer to Francis Hight. Under an agreement, Hight gave Twin Springs Joy's first calf to the agriculture department, which awarded the calf to Norville Robbins.

The heifer sold at Jerome Saturday was Twin Springs Joy's fourth calf.

## POSITIONS OPEN IN SERVICE SCHOOLS

Congressman Lowell Stockman of the second district of Oregon will have two vacancies at the U. S. naval academy, Annapolis, Maryland, for the class beginning July 1, 1949. He will also have one vacancy for the same class at the U. S. military academy, West Point, New York. Applicants for these vacancies must be resident of the second district of Oregon.

Stockman will have competitive examinations given by the U. S. civil service commission July 12, 1948 to aid in the selection of the nominees for both academies. Candidates for the naval academy must be not less than 17 years of age nor more than 21 years of age on April 1, 1949, in which they enter the naval academy. Candidates for the military academy must be between the ages of 17 and 22 years of age on April 1 of the calendar year in which he enters the naval academy, and he can enter the military academy provided he has not passed his 24th birthday on the first of July in the year during which he would enter that academy.

Applicants must be unmarried, should be high school seniors, or graduates of high school, or college students, and in perfect physical condition.

All boys who are interested and qualified should write immediately to Congressman Lowell Stockman, House Office building, Washington, D. C., so that they may receive additional information and be admitted to the examination.
