

GOVERNOR DEWEY HIGHLIGHTS TRIP

Malheur county to find a perfect day", Governor Dewey said. "If I could think of any excuse to sit here for a week, I would do it".

Taking issue with one of his opponents for the nomination on the question of outlawing the communist party, the governor said the Kremlin in Moscow has issued its semi-annual statement offering to discuss world problems with the United States and added that "If they mean it, it is the best news since V-J day. If such a conference is held, I hope we can carry it forward with skill. I hope we have learned you can't buy peace with

appeasement; all you do is make trouble. This proposal was made because for the first time our administration has been showing some strength in international affairs. At last I have hopes we are going to begin spending this 17 billion dollars over the world to promote peace. We have vacillated from strength to weakness and from weakness to strength. Now at last, prodded by the republican party, the administration is beginning to show some signs of settling some of these problems around the conference table. We must continue in all of the years ahead to deal from strength. I want to spend the 17 billion like hard-headed Americans instead of soft-headed saps as we have been doing.

"We can use our resources to

build America so strong we won't send our children into another war. You have enough power potential in this state to develop the greatest area in the world, but that must depend on peace. Then we can go ahead with reclaiming the millions of acres of fertile land. We can go forward when we get a government that: 1—understands our problems and strives to solve them, and 2—an administration which will give competence to our government".

Recalling his experiences with the communists in New York, Governor Dewey said "I am against outlawing communists. I want to keep them out in the open so we can lick 'em. We can lick 'em in the open".

Advocating free discussion of the communists, the governor said "You can rely on the people if they know the truth. If we can outlaw the communists, Wallace can outlaw the republican and democratic parties and I am against it. We can remain free so long as we keep our right to listen to anyone, and as long as we keep the communists in the open we can do that. Canada tried twice to outlaw the communist party and repealed the law because it did not work.

"Communists are worms and they prosper underground. This country has grown and prospered because of our principles, which benefit even those we hate. I want to keep those worms out in the open. Don't let anyone sell you on any other idea".

In his Nyssa address, Governor Dewey said he was glad to provide an excuse for so many children to "get out of one and perhaps two classes".

"Peace is the No. 1 problem. You

can't plan your sugar business, your farming or even your children's education until you know whether this country is drifting into war. For the first time in two and one-half years we are dealing from strength. Peace is something you fight for. You don't just sit down and hope".

The governor urged the development of reclamation, power and other resources and particularly referred to Oregon's resources, which he declared to be "unbelievable".

"Twenty years ago Malheur county's income was less than \$5,000,000 a year and now it is \$29,000,000. Let's develop the power that will increase production. Food is our greatest resource in waging the peace. The government in Washington has grown like Topsy. If it had been this sugar factory, the company would have been busted a long time ago".

Governor Dewey arrived at the Ontario airport by United Air Lines from Bend about 11 o'clock and was greeted by a crowd of approximately 100 persons. After a round of picture-taking, the group drove to the Moore hotel, where Governor Dewey rested for an hour.

As the governor entered the dining room to attend a luncheon given in his honor, the diners stood and sang "For He's A Jolly Good Fellow", and then sang one verse of "America".

John Caldwell of Vale, chairman of the Malheur county republican central committee, who presided at the luncheon, presented Mayor Elmo Smith, who introduced Governor Dewey as "one of the outstanding statesmen of our time".
