1439 in Malheur county and Gallagher 1165 and Wilson 1306. Wilson will be unopposed in the fall election, but Smith will be opposed by Dr. W. J. Weese of Ontario, who received 1163 democratic votes. Although official returns have not been received here yet on the voting in Harney and Grant counties in the senatorial race, Smith is believed to have carried them by a considerable margin. The 22nd senatorial district includes Malheur, Grant and Harney counties.

Thomas E. Dewey carried Malheur county by a comfortable margin over Harold E. Stassen for the republican nomination for president. Other republican votes were cast as follows: Representative in congress, Stockman 1708 and Weather- spoon 590; for governor, Hall 1450, McKay 947, Peyton 106 and Ackerman 166; secretary of state, Plagg 550 and Newberry 1927; state treasurer, Belton 1110, Unander 633 and Bean 472; attorney general, Jones 996 and Neuner 1165.

County Clerk H. S. Sackett and Murray Morton, seeking the office of assessor, were nominated without opposition. President Truman received 1048 democratic votes in Malheur county. Other democratic votes were as follows: United States senator, Wilson 563 and Wood 615; representative in congress, Shorb 949; governor, Wallace 1076; secretary of state, Carney 663 and Silverman 414; treasurer, Pearson 1022, attorney general, Murray 984; state senator, Weese 1163. Robert Davis for sheriff and John Koopman for assessor were unopposed.
