

READING PROGRAM WELL UNDER-WAY

The summer reading program sponsored by the Parent-Teacher association and the county library is well under way. Mrs. Bernard Eastman is library chairman for the Nyssa P.T.A.

The story hour for younger children, which is held on the lawn outside the library every Tuesday at 2:30, has been well attended. Last Tuesday 50 children listened to Miss Jean Pennington of the county library, who is telling the stories this month.

Miss Lillian Nisbet, county librarian, is also at the Nyssa library on Tuesdays, helping the children and providing additional books from the county library as they are needed.

Mrs. L. H. Trabert, Nyssa librarian, reports that there is a brisk call for the blanks on which books reports are made for the certificate awards. These reports are very easy to fill out as most of the reporting is done by underlining words on the report blanks, Mrs. Trabert said. A first grader will probably need help, however, in filling out the author and title lines. Every child in grades one to seven was given a printed slip to take home before school closed, which gave an outline of the rules of the reading plan. If this has been lost, another may be obtained at the library. A plain certificate will be awarded to those who report on five books read any time between the last day of school and the first day of school this fall. Reading seven books will win

a green seal on the certificate, if two are read after June 15. Nine books read earn a red seal and 11 books a gold seal. If some are read in July or August. So, anyone on vacation is spent where there is a standard children's library, a list of the books read may be turned in at the end of the summer, if it is signed by the librarian of the library and the child's parent. Those living at a distance from a library in Malheur county may obtain a home library by writing to the county library at Ontario.

Two community libraries have been established for the children of the Owyhee district, where the P.T.A. has sponsored the summer program. These libraries are in the homes of Mrs. Wilson Winter and Mrs. Claude Wilson. Mrs. Harvey Bennett has the library in the Wade district and Mrs. Ferguson in the Big Bend district.

Mrs. Jake Borge, summer reading chairman for the Kingman Colony P.T.A., is at the Adrian grade school building every Thursday at 2:30 p.m., when Miss Nisbet consults with the children about their reading and conducts a story hour.

Other P.T.A.'s active in the program are Willow Creek, Grove, Vale and Lindbergh and Conkili at Ontario. Any children may enter the reading program where there is a P.T.A. Plans are under way for the county library to issue awards to children who are interested and in whose school there is no Parent-Teacher association.
