SHIPPING CAUSES HIGH 'SPUD' LOSS

(Continued From Page One) that the immaturity favored brown rot, speeded up greening on the grocers' shelves and allowed decay bacteria to enter the tubers. Both cars shipped were from badly to moderately skinned and certainly did not measure up to the mature California long whites which were bringing up to 70 cents per hundred premium over the immature spuds.

Other factors contributing to decay included harvesting methods and conditions, handling in the packing sheds and conditions during shipment. There were indications that considerable disease may have been present in the field from

which the poorest was shipped. This did not appear when graded after washing but did favor the development of soft rot during the transportation period, the extension agent explained.

A number of retailers were contacted in the Chicago area. Few potatoes from this area were found on their shelves. Idaho-Oregon Bliss triumphs were retailing at rates from \$6.25 to \$7.80 per hundred.

Nebraska warbas were giving the Idaho-Oregon reds considerable competition and were retailing at about the same price.

The most of the potatoes retail in lots of five pounds or less and with a preference for medium sized red potatoes, Bailey concluded.

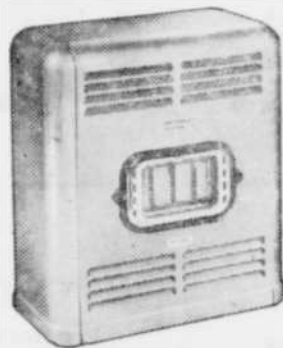
