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Board Revising Hospital Plans To Fit Budget

Government Denies Loan But Construction To Start Soon

Following receipt of information stating that the government had rejected an application for federal aid for the Malheur Memorial hospital, the directors of the association voted at a meeting Tuesday night to slightly revise the hospital plans to fit the association's budget.

The state board of health recommended that the association re-apply for federal aid for equipment and a chronic disease center.

The community raised \$262,000 last fall for a new hospital and equipment with the thought that the amount would be sufficient. However, by the time bids were opened a few weeks ago prices had risen to such an extent that the bids were higher than the amount of money available for the building. The low bid, submitted by Leslie W. Stoker of Nyssa, was \$255,448.28. Under the revised plans the construction cost will be considerably reduced. In fact, the cost has already been pared to \$235,000.

Despite the anticipated changes, the proposed plan will be included in the new building.

E. G. Harrington, one of the architects, is expected here this week from Portland to confer with the hospital directors, who announced that construction will be started in a very few weeks.

Frank T. Morgan, Prominent Nyssa Resident, Passes

Funeral Held For Farmer, Businessman And Civic Leader

Funeral services were held Monday morning of this week for Frank T. Morgan of Nyssa, prominent Malheur county resident, who died last Friday morning as the result of a paralytic stroke.

Private services were held in the Nyssa funeral home chapel at 10:30 a. m., followed by interment in the Nyssa cemetery, where a large group of friends attended committal services. Rev. C. L. Calahan of the Episcopal church officiated. Pallbearers were Ira Ure, George Mitchell, Dr. J. J. Sarazin, R. G. Larson, Burnall Brown and Luther Fife.

Mrs. Morgan, called home because of her husband's death was receiving treatment in a Portland hospital, where she had been ill for some time. She came to Nyssa Friday evening by airplane and returned to Portland by automobile with her son, Clayton, Tuesday of this week.

Mr. Morgan suffered a stroke Thursday, August 19 while irrigating on his farm a short distance north of Nyssa. He apparently over-exerted himself when he attempted to extricate his automobile from mud alongside the road and collapsed on the highway while walking to the house.

Mr. Morgan, born in Oakfield, Wisconsin, October 31, 1889, was graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1910 and was married to Jessie M. Calkins November 12, 1914 in Eugene, Oregon. When returning to Malheur county in 1915, Mr. Morgan became principal of the Nyssa high school and served in that capacity for one year. He then purchased a ranch in Kingman Kolony, where he lived for 10 years before moving to Nyssa. Mr. Morgan was one of the leaders in the fight to secure government money for construction of the Owyhee project and from that time to his death was actively identified with reclamation. He became secretary of the Owyhee Irrigation district August 2, 1927, succeeding Ed Blodgett, who was the first secretary of the district. During the early years of the district Mr. Morgan was active in the colonization of the project, principally as secretary of the Vale-Owyhee Land Settlement association, which position he held until his death. It was largely through his efforts that settlers were induced to locate on the semi-arid land.

Continuing his interest in reclamation, Mr. Morgan became active in the Oregon Reclamation Congress and served as president of the organization from 1932 to 1944. He was also active in the affairs of the National Reclamation association. Mr. Morgan was a member of the Owyhee appraisal board for many years.

In addition to his activity in the reclamation field, Mr. Morgan held offices in many other public bodies during his life time. He served as a county commissioner and held offices in the republican party organization in the county. During his service as secretary of the Nyssa chamber of commerce for more than 20 years, Mr. Morgan continually worked on promotional projects designed to benefit the community. He served as president of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of Southwestern Idaho and Eastern Oregon in 1946.

He was a past president of the Nyssa Lions club and a member of the Episcopal church, the Masonic lodge and the Elks lodge. After leaving Kingman Kolony, Mr. Morgan purchased a farm about a mile north of Nyssa and lived there the remainder of his life. He purchased the insurance business of Ed Blodgett in Nyssa about 15 years ago and operated it until the time of his death. In addition to his farms, Mr. Morgan owned considerable business property in Nyssa.

When plans were developing for raising funds for a hospital in this community, Mr. Morgan was elected chairman of the campaign and later was elected president of the Malheur Memorial Hospital association, which expects to start construction of the new hospital soon.

Besides his widow, Mr. Morgan is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Blaine Ballah of Denver, who was visiting her father at the time of his death; two sons, Frank T. Morgan, Jr. of Nyssa and Clayton, who will enter the University of Oregon Medical school next month and three brothers and two sisters living in the east.
