As provided by Chapter 204, 1927 Laws, no person shall be qualified to vote at a primary, General or Special Election unless he or she shall be registered.

Electors cannot be sworn in to vote on election day.

Registration books are now open and will be open until the night of October 2nd., 1948.

If you were registered and did not vote at either the Primary or General Election in 1946, or have changed your residence or if you desire to change your political affiliations, you must re-register.
