"We cannot afford any luxuries because prices are too high. The wages are always gone for groceries. We hope that things will be better in the spring and we cannot let our spirits fall.

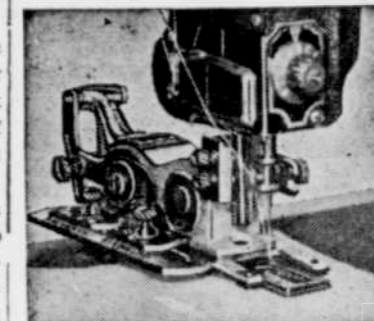
"We have besides our daughter, a little son who is 1 1/2 years old. His name is Joe. He is a sweet little guy. And we live only for

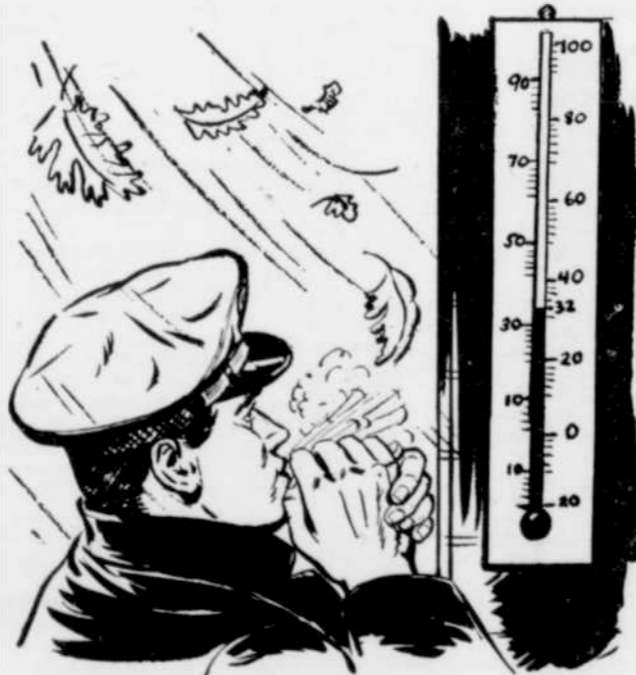
