

**SEVERAL PRACTICES CAN BE FOLLOWED**

"Now that many of the crops are off the land and there are a few weeks before winter sets in, there is an opportunity to carry out a number of conservation practices," said Glen L. Hutchinson, chairman of the Malheur county agricultural conservation committee.

"Malheur county farmers should be able to carry out such practices as land leveling, construction of drainage ditches, the building of stock-water dams, seeding of cover crops, and installation of concrete pipe and concrete structures in their ditches.

"Some farmers may not have completed practices started last spring and a number of these can be completed now.

Before work is started on a project, application should be made at the County ACA office and when practices are completed they should be reported. Sales slips, seed tags or other evidence to show that practices have been carried out in accordance with specified stand-

ards should be included with the report."

Mr. Hutchinson said that the agricultural conservation program is a cooperative effort between farmers and consumers. Funds which are provided to assist in carrying out conservation practices represent the nation's interest in its soil and water resources. The farmer puts up his share of the cost and in most cases all the labor.

**THE GILLNETTERS WOULD SNARE YOU WITH THEIR NET OF MONOPOLY!!**



MRS. HOUSEWIFE... when one small group gains control of a food product's source can you imagine what might happen to the price of that food product—and to your cost of living? Throwing out a net of high-sounding words about "resources, sports fishing and tourist dollars" the Gillnetters' Union have forgotten to tell you one thing.

The initiative bill for the elimination of fixed gear in the Columbia River gives to the gillnetters 90% of all the catch on the Columbia River — the remaining 10% being caught by the Indians at Celilo.

The Oregon Fish Commission in its June, 1948 report, the Oregon Voter, and Oregon State Planning Board, all say the same thing. Elimination of fixed gear on the Columbia River does not act as a salmon conservation project—but in reality only means that other gear catch more and the gillnets will be all that are left.

What could happen to your food budget under a virtual monopoly? What might happen to salmon prices? You have had experience with other monopolies—what is your answer?

And bear this fact in mind—if the gillnetters did not want to gain absolute control—why would they initiate this monopoly bill? Both the state legislature and the Oregon Fish Commission have the authority to regulate all gear for salmon fishing, if it were necessary.

The bill to "eliminate fixed appliances" is not necessary — it only puts monopolistic control in the hands of a minority group — the gillnetters.
